

Huerta's Assassinations Are Bloodier Than Real Warfare

List of Men, Opposed to Dictator's Policies, Who Have Disappeared Suddenly, Is Steadily Growing Larger

VERA CRUZ, April 21.—The most conservative description of Huerta's regime is told in the one word "pitiless." Mexico is a bloody land at best, but the historian of the future, when he writes of Huerta's deeds, will describe one of Mexico's bloodiest periods. The blood spilling of open warfare is not so repulsive as the blood letting of the assassin or the cold-blooded, secret murder and burial of men in hidden out-of-the-way places.

How many leading men of Mexico, of various parties, have silently disappeared from sight cannot now be ascertained. The whole thing is a subject that no one in Mexico City dares to mention. The newspaper men who would attempt to ferret out the mystery would be subjected immediately to Article No. 33 of the constitution, which provides that any foreigner who writes anything against Mexico shall be immediately deported.

But the truth is slowly coming out, nevertheless, through opponents of Huerta, and through some of their stories, secretly given to the writer, may be overdrawn, nevertheless they are interesting as indicating the horror with which the average citizen of Mexico City views Huerta's doings.

The story of the assassination of Serapio Rendon, however, is known to be true. He was a graduate of Cornell University in the United States and a member of the house of deputies, opposed to Huerta. One evening in August, 1912, he was a dinner guest at the mansion of an American society woman. During the dinner he said:

"I know that I will drop from sight some day. I fully expect it."

At 11 o'clock he started for home, but was seized on the way.

The next day a ruse was offered for sale to Dr. Emilio Cardenas, in the village of Tlanepantla, a pair of spectacles in a case which bore Rendon's initials. Dr. Cardenas, it happened was a friend of Rendon. He purchased the spectacles and case, and questioned the ruse.

"They belonged to a man killed last night," said the ruse. "We were ordered to shoot him, but he tried to

fight, and so we gave him twenty bullets."

Where Rendon was buried is not known; his family does not dare to seek information.

The story of the assassination of Belisario Dominguez surpasses the belief of the man who doesn't know Mexico. Dominguez, a senator, had openly opposed Huerta. Mexicans here believe the story that Dominguez who was forced to go to a hospital for a slight illness, was under the influence of chloroform for a minor operation when word came to the proprietor of the hospital, Dr. Urrutia, who was then Huerta's right hand man, that Dominguez should be executed.

The unconscious man, it is said, was taken into a vacant lot in the dead of night, and shot. Dominguez was wealthy and talented.

Rafael Villacorta and Alfonso Escalona, two newspaper reporters who sympathized with Madero, met their death in a corn field in the suburbs of Mexico City.

Huerta, it is said, when he first became dictator, sought the whereabouts of various Madero senators. He tried to locate Bordes Mangel, a leading Maderista, and discovered that the two newspaper reporters, Villacorta and Escalona, had recently interviewed Mangel. The newspaper men were arrested and ordered to tell where Mangel might be found. Escalona refused and was summarily sentenced to be shot.

Villacorta, it is said, gave the facts on promise of being released. On June 28, Francisco Chavez, the chief of police, sent the two men, in the care of guards, to a suburban town. On the way their guards said to them:

"We are going to let you go. You run into that corn field, and we'll say you got away from us."

The young fellows, both delighted, jumped from the automobile in which they were riding and, waving their hands in "goodbyes," dashed for the cornfield.

They had not gone 100 feet before their guards shot them both dead. In official parlance, they had been given the "ley de fuga," or "law of flight."

In the grim San Juan de Uluia prison at Vera Cruz there now lies Mrs. Guadalupe Guille de Saldano, with a

new-born baby girl. Her crime is that she is the cousin to Adolfo Orive, a rebel.

One evening last January the police entered the Saldano home during the dinner hour and took Saldano and his wife off to the penitentiary. An hour later she was taken to the train for Vera Cruz. Her destination was Quintana Roo, a district which is Mexico's Siberia.

Women who go there are fed to the lust of convict soldiers. Quintana Roo is a name of horror to the men and women of Mexico. It was the birth of her baby, while she was being held in San Juan Uluia prison for a passport to Quintana Roo that saved her.

As time passed her aged mother in Mexico City traced her to prison, and the authorities gave her permission to attempt a court procedure to release Mrs. Saldano. Since the husband and wife parted at the doors of the penitentiary that January night, not a word has been heard from him. He is not in the penitentiary or in any of the jails of the city.

These are a few of the stories that the opponents of Huerta have been able to smuggle to Americans through the United Press. These stories just scratch the surface of conditions. Dr. Urrutia, General Blanquet and Ganon, one of Mexico's favorite bull fighters, sat together at a banquet one evening.

"Look at the three matadors," said Huerta, from across the table. He meant "killers." It was a terribly grim joke, but it brought a laugh, even from the two statesmen.

400,000 TOPERS IN GERMANY NOW

OF THIS NUMBER OF HABITUALS, ONE-TENTH ARE WOMEN—STATISTICS ARE GIVEN REGARDING DRINKING BY WOMEN

BERLIN, April 21.—There are 400,000 drunkards in Germany, of whom 40,000 are women. This was the declaration made by President Frau Gerken at the meeting of the Berlin Women's Association against alcoholism.

Frau Gerken said that there were between 2,500 and 3,000 women drunkards in Berlin.

Speaking of the psychology of noisome companionship in drinking, women drunkards tried to conceal their falling and were addicted to "solitary sponges."

In most cases, she said, heavy drinking among women was due to sickness, unemployment, loss of standing and despondency. She said it was more difficult to cure and restore a woman than a man.

Colombian Treaty Signed
 Administration officials are pleased over the signing at Bogota of the treaty with Colombia. The United States is to pay Colombia \$25,000,000 for the land taken during the Roosevelt administration. The treaty fixes the boundary line between Panama and Colombia, and Colombia is granted certain favors in use of the canal for shipping.

One Way Fare for Trip to Two Fairs

SAN DIEGO, April 21.—Action by the Transcontinental Association at its recent meeting in San Francisco, on railroad rates to California during 1915, the exposition year, has caused officials of the San Diego exposition, which opens on January 1, 1914, and continues open the entire year, to feel assured of a large attendance of visitors from Eastern states at this exposition.

A one-way fare for the round trip to the Panama-Pacific exposition in San Francisco, to Los Angeles and the

Panama-California exposition in Diego, from all points west of Chicago, was agreed upon by the Transcontinental Passenger Association.

Tourists to or from either of the California expositions will be given the opportunity of being routed through Los Angeles, and the visitors will be able to take in both expositions on one ticket.

The rates agreed upon are the same as those allowed during the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition at Seattle, and are practically the rates asked by the directors of the expositions.

To Test New Plow
 Manufacturers have purchased 320 acres of land near San Angelo, Tex., and will test their new plow, which will tap the soil 18 inches below the surface and leave the ground in condition to hold 50 per cent more water than with the ordinary plow. The new plow spades up the soil, leaving the top in its original condition.
