The new Cunard liner Aquitania, now being built, and the Vaterland, to be finished this year.
The Aquitania is 291 feet long with a beam of 57 feet and a depth of 64 feet. When fully equipped the ship will displace about 55,000 tons of water. Her normal sea speed will be twenty-three knots. She was designed to accommodate 4,210 persons including 876 first class passengers, 294 second class and 1,700 third class, and a crew of nearly 1,000.

Poor House Inmate
May Be Opera Star

LONDON, April 22.—When, owing to her sunny nature, little Mabel Clarke burst into song the other day at the West Ham poorhouse, she never imagined that her voice would raise her from the uninspiring vocation of household drudge branded with the stigma of the pauper to future comfort, and probably fame, in the operatic world. Mabel is just 14.
Her parents died recently, leaving her homeless and penniless. She was

taken in charge by the West Ham board of guardians. As usual with girls of her class she was put at housework with a view to training her as a domestic servant.
Shortly afterwards some of the guardians while visiting the infirmary heard her singing. The dingy walls had never echoed such melody before.
The guardians immediately sent for her. They were not expert judges of music, but they realized that she possessed a phenomenal voice.
After a consultation it was decided to send her to the Royal College of Music to be tested.
It was found that she has a compass of three octaves and a note, and has the makings of an unusual contralto voice.

Resolution
Declaring the Intention of the City of Klamath Falls to Improve Eleventh Street in Said City From Main Street to Upham Street; Worden Avenue From Upham to Donald, and Donald Street From Worden Avenue to Sargent Street.

Whereas, A petition signed by more than ten freeholders of the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, and filed with the Police Judge thereof, and presented to the Common Council, having for its object the improvement of Eleventh street in said city from Main street to Upham street, Worden avenue from Upham street to Donald street; Donald street from Worden avenue to Sargent street, including all the intersections of said streets;
And, Whereas, The Common Council has directed the city engineer to survey the said streets and prepare plans and specifications and estimate of cost of various kinds of improvements of the said streets; and the said city engineer having filed with the Police Judge for the consideration of members of the Common Council plans and specifications and estimate of cost of the several varieties of improvement;
And, Whereas, The said plans and specifications and estimates are found satisfactory after examination by the council;

Be It Resolved, That the said plans and specifications are hereby approved and the Common Council hereby expresses its determination to improve the said streets within the limits defined by grading the same and improving with oil macadam pavement with a 4-inch Water Macadam base and a 2-inch Asphalt Macadam top, with a concrete curb and gutter as per plans and specifications on file, together with the necessary drainage. The width of roadway to be 24 feet.
That the plans, specifications and estimates of the city engineer covering the proposed work are to be used as a basis for the said work, and any contract for such improvement shall be based thereon and the estimated cost of such work and improvement as submitted by said engineer at \$11,779.75, is hereby adopted as the probable cost of the said work.

And it is further resolved, That the time within which objections or remonstrances may be heard against the proposed improvement shall be on or before the 11th day of May, 1914.
And it is further resolved, That the boundaries within which the property lies that is to be benefited by said improvement is all that property lying adjacent to the said streets, from Main to Upham within a line on each side of said streets so improved, distant 120 feet from the side lines of said streets, from Upham to Donald streets 110 feet on each side, and from Worden avenue to Sargent avenue 150 feet on each side, along the line of the streets improved;
And it is further resolved, That the notice required by charter to be given to the property owners affected by the proposed improvement shall be duly given as by the said charter provided.
