## OUR WEEKLY SERMON

## "Voices From Calvary"

words of our dearest friends, so at the foot of the cross let us tarry a few minutes.

First we notice the voice of forgiveness. (Luke 23:34—"Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do.") Jesus in his suffering looked on the best side of his enemies, and remembering that his agony was because of man's sins, he prayed for "his own who received him not." This prayer was for those who in ignorance were killing the Son of God. Stephen follows this example in Acts, 7:60—"Lord, lay not this sin to their charge," when he was called upon to die for the Gospel's sake.

Second, the voice of natural affection. John, 19:26-27—"Woman, behold thy Son; behold thy mother." These last words were spoken to the Disciple John, and from that hour he took her to his own home. The cross of Christ has changed the dwelling of the savage into a Christian home. In ancient times the father was a tyrant, the mother a slave and the child a chattel.

Third, the voice of the soul's need. Matt. 27:46—"My God, why hast thou forsaken me?" Here the Savior of men is receiving the baptism of suffering to which he referred when two of his disciples desired high places in his kingdom. (Mk. 10:38, "Can ye drink of the cup I drink of and be baptized with the baptism I am baptized with?") Although the

Father seems to hide his face from his Son in this dark hour as he tasted of sin for us (II. Cor., 5:21—"He hath made him to be sin for us, who knew no sin that we might be made the righteousness of God in him"), still the Son clings to the Father, for he knows that "without the shedding of blood there is no remission of sins."

Fourth, the voice of bodily want. John, 19:28—"I thirst." In the great spiritual battle the physical body cannot be overlooked. Christ left the river of life for his thirst after love, and they would not give him a drink of water. An angel could never have reached lost man, but only Him who could bear himself our infirmities.

Fifth, the voice of victory. John, 19:30—"It is finished." The Galilean has conquered. The ransom was paid. His suffering is over. Every altar in the Old Testament pointed with flaming finger to this hour. The holy place in the temple was now open to the world. This was the last act of the Jewish dispensation. The last sacrifice is being offered. God never required another sacrifice which meant death. Rom., 12:1—"Present your bodies a living sacrifice."

Sixth, the voice of Peace. Luke, 23:46—"Father, into thy hands I commend my spirit." What a glorious consummation! No wonder Roman, the skeptic, shouts, "Whatever may be the surprises of the future, Jesus will never be surpassed." A new and living way has been opened for us through the veil of his flesh. The groaning rocks indicate the birth pangs of a new life.

Seventh, the voice of promise. Luke, 23:43—"Today shalt thou be with me in the spirit world." One who has never turned a deaf ear to anyone in life would not do so in death. His pierced hands swung heaven's gates wide open, and from that day they have not been closed to one who would obey the Savior.

"The dying thief rejoiced to see that fountain in his day; And there may I, though vile as he, Wash all my sins away."
