THE WATER QUESTION

ONE WEEK from today will be settled who will be the mayor of this city for the next two years, and as a consequence the candidates and their friends are preparing for the final struggle. Already can be found signs of increasing interest, and this will grow until by the end of the week the city will be alive with the issues of the campaign.

One of the important matters that is bound to receive the close attention of the voters of the people of Klamath Falls is the question of municipal ownership. Three years ago this question was submitted to the voters of the city, and by a vote of nearly three to one the people declared themselves in favor of municipal ownership. No serious effort has since been made to accomplish this result, and the question is again before the people in the matter of candidates. One of the candidates, E. J. Murray, has placed himself clearly before the voters on this point, declaring in his platform:

"I am in favor of the city acquiring its own water works—the present one, if equitable terms can be reached with the owners; a new one if fair terms cannot be agreed upon. This can be done without adding one cent to the burden of taxation or increasing the cost to the consumer. I believe the water rates can be lowered."

And he further declares: "But a short time remains before Klamath Falls will be operating its own power and light plant."

Mr. Murray's record as a municipal ownership advocate is already known, and if he is elected he must of necessity immediately proceed to carry out the declaration of his platform.

So far none of the other candidates for mayor have declared themselves on this question in which the city is vitally interested. In fact, no opportunity has been given the public to know how the majority of the candidates stand on any of the important problems which the city will have to meet within the next few years.

We believe that the voters would like to be informed on these matters, and to enable the candidates to do so we will offer the columns of the Herald without charge. Inasmuch as the people of this city voted by an overwhelming majority in favor of the municipal ownership of a water system, we believe that every candidate for mayor should be honest and frank enough to tell the voters just what they are willing to do about a municipal plant, in case they are elected to office.

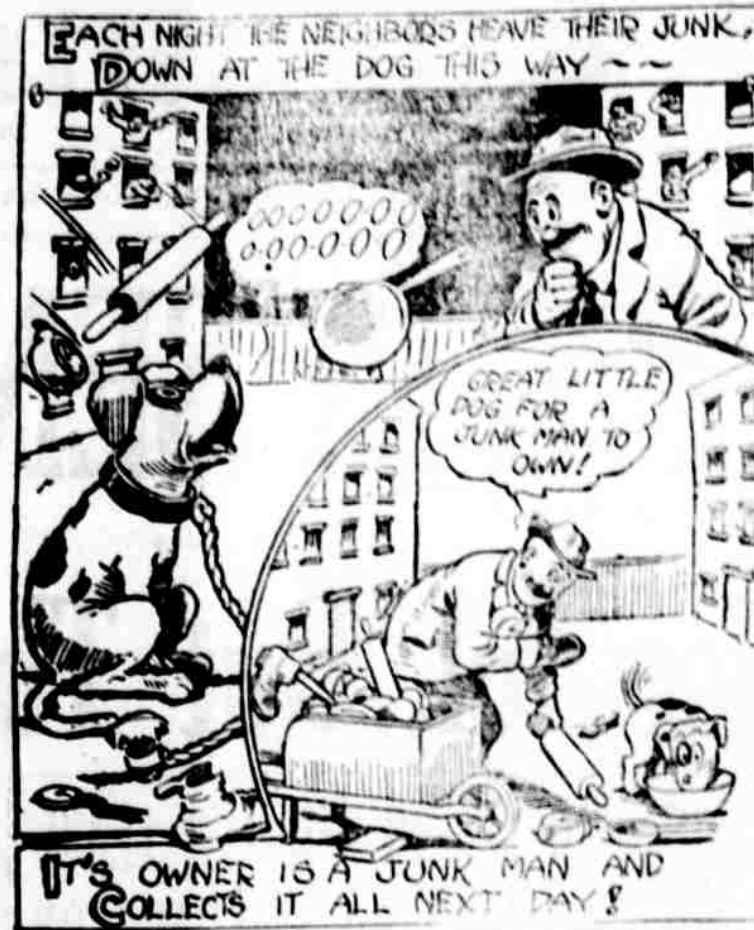
