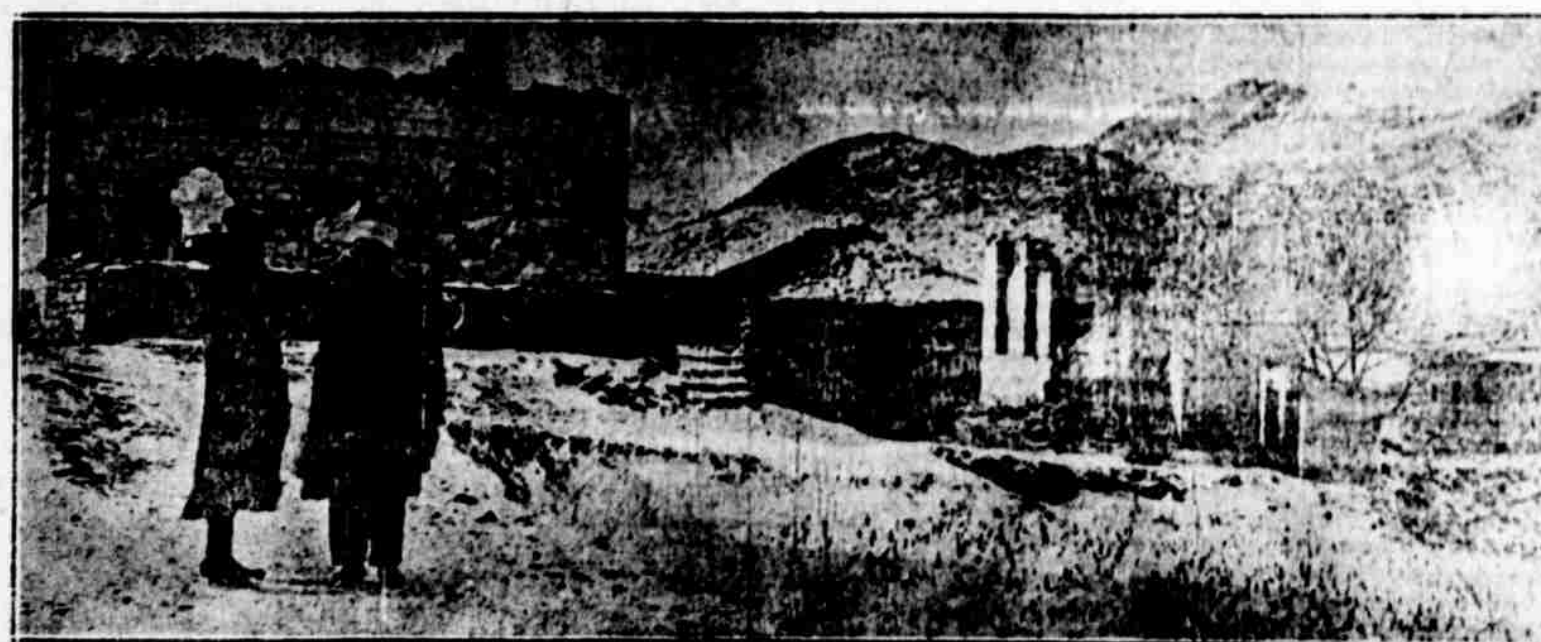

Mohammedan Church in Albania Burned Ten Months After Balkan War



This photograph shows the destruction wrought by Servian troops in Albania ten months after the Balkan war. The photograph was brought to the United States by W. W. Howard, who has travelled extensively on foot through Mohammedan Albania to learn of the cruelty of Servian troops. In the foreground of the photograph

are the Rev. P. B. Kennedy, an American missionary, and Aziz Effendi, local official of the town.

The picture, taken in October, last year, ten months after the Balkan war had closed, shows the ruin of a school and church at Kleinalc. The Servian troops sent out in companies and regiments had ravaged the territory.

They burned the homes, churches and schools of the helpless Mohammedan Albanians wherever found. When Mr. Howard tried in London to get church authorities interested in preventing this work, he was told he was "attacking the Christian religion." Now he has come to the United States to raise funds to help the Albanians, who are starving at the rate of 60,000 a year. He has established the Albanian Relief fund at 90 Bible House, New York city, and he hopes to raise sufficient money to help these people. He has asked American farmers to send seed corn so the suffering may have a crop this year. Without it more will starve to death.

The Philadelphia inventor of a new power engine which is working successfully in Egypt has figured that it would be necessary to cover but 29,250 square miles of the Sahara desert with engines to obtain as much power as the world's coal supplied in 1913.

French aviators flew 8,548,881 miles last year, as compared with 2,000,000 miles in 1913; 123,000 hours were occupied in flights, as compared with 39,000 hours, and 41,000 passengers were carried, four times as many as the previous year.

A French scientist attributes the benefit of sunlight at high altitudes upon persons to a preponderance of ultra-violet rays, which induce a more active circulation of the blood.

Plumbing Ordinance Resurrected Awhile

After being buried in oblivion for at least two years, the plumbing ordinance came to light again at last night's meeting of the council, and after it was read in its entirety, it was taken away by Councilman Matthews for revamping, etc.

The measure consists of forty-nine sections. It provides for the methods of plumbing in the city, makes it compulsory for the plumbing to be all inspected by the inspector of plumbing

and gas, and provides for the issuance of permits to do a job of plumbing and the licensing of plumbers and master plumbers.

The measure, though, fails to provide for the plumbing inspector, an office which is also neglected in the city charter.

There was an intermingling of caustic comment and ironical humor by the council during the reading of the lengthy document. Matthews, who brought the ordinance in, grew

wrathful at the levity on the part of members of the board.

"You will monkey along with something like dog licenses, but when it comes to an ordinance like this, which is for the health of the people, you're not there," he said.

"That ordinance is one of the strictest I have ever seen, and it practically prohibits a man from putting in a faucet for himself. I have a mind to build a kitchen, if this ordinance is adopted, and just make a test of the measure," said Doty.
