ARMY UNIFORMS FOR EXPO GUARDS

SAN FRANCISCO, April 29.—A regulation army olive drab, with orange colored piping, was the uniform formally adopted today for the guards at the Panama-Pacific Exposition.

There are at present less than 100 guards on the exposition grounds, but this number will be increased to about 800 after the gates are opened.
