STAATSBURG, N. Y., May 1.—
Vincent Astor, head of the "House of
Astor," and the richest bachelor in
America, was married yesterday to
Miss Helen Dinmore Huntington,
daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert P.
Huntington.

The ceremony, performed at the
magnificent home of the bride's par-
ents by the Rev. C. H. Duncan, of
St. Margaret's Episcopal Church, was
unique in the annals of New York
society. By mutual agreement of the
bride and bridegroom and their re-
spective families, it was, perhaps, the
simplest wedding ultra New York so-
ciety has ever known. It was at first
planned to have the ceremony per-
formed at St. Margaret's Church, but
the bridegroom's recent illness caused
the change.

Municipal Electric
Plant in Cleveland

CLEVELAND, May 1.—The city of
Cleveland—home of 3-cent street car
fares, and other progressive municipal
advantages—today began furnishing
its "customers," residents of Cleve-
land, with electricity at 3 cents the
kilowatt hour.
The regular price charged by cor-
porations is 10 cents. At the start
40,000 "customers" can be supplied.
Two big municipal electric-making
plants turned their wheels today for
the first time.
Backers of the project are con-
fident it will mean private corporations
must be forced down to the same
price.
The making of electricity for sale
to its residents is by no means new
to progressive Cleveland. For several
years enough electricity has been
made to supply 4,000 people.
Eventually, city officials declared
today, Cleveland will furnish elec-
tricity for every home in the city un-
less private corporations come down
to Cleveland's 3-cent charge.
