Will Seek New Markets
for Oregon Products

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, May
6.—At a meeting of the board of al-
livers of the new university school of
commerce held in Portland, it was de-
cided that the school begin an indus-
trial survey for the purpose of formu-
lating statistics that will be of use in
finding markets for Oregon products.
In order to reduce the expense of such

a survey to the minimum, the survey
will be made mainly through the es-
tablished bureaus of the United States
government.

The board of advisers intends to
ask the government to send a special
representative abroad to investigate
the lumber market. The survey will
be under the direction of H. B. Miller,
former United States consul in China,
Manchuria and Ireland.

"The industrial survey that is to be
conducted will be of great value to
Oregon industries," said President
Campbell. "There is a considerable
over production now, and if markets
can be found for the surplus products
it will be a great boon for the manu-
facturers of our state."

Mayor and Council
Are Sentenced to Jail

MUNICH, May 6.—The Bavarian
district court has sentenced the mayor
of Partenkirche, a large town on the
edge of the Bavarian Alps, together
with the entire town council, to jail
for libeling a young woman teacher
in the schools there.

The mayor was given three days in
jail and the members of the council

each two days. All have appealed.
If the higher courts sustain the
sentence, the town, which is an im-
portant summer resort, will be with-
out government for several days.

atory remarks made by the mayor and
councilmen in a row with the teacher

furnish her while engaged as teacher

Work at Tunnels
The work on the Tumalo project is
now in full swing, with camps Nos. 1,
4, 5, 6 and 7 in full operation, and it
