Says Friedmann Cure Is Worthless
Tuberculosis Expert Speaks After a Year's Test

EMINENT PHYSICIANS GET TO-
GETHER IN NEW YORK AND
DISCUSS THE DREADED WHITE
PLAGUE AND THE BEST METH-
ODS FOR ITS TREATMENT—DR.
FRANZ FRIEDMANN'S TREAT-
MENT IS CONDEMNED AFTER A
YEAR OF CAREFUL EXPERI-
MENTATION AND OBSERVATION

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 8.—Dr.
Franz Friedmann's vaccine, after a
year of careful experimentation, ac-
cording to Dr. George Mannheimer of
New York, has exhibited neither curative
nor preventive powers, and it cannot,
therefore, be recommended. Dr. Mann-
heimer made this statement today at the
sessions of the National Association for
the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis
at its annual convention here.

"In March, 1913," said Dr. Mann-
heimer, "eighteen patients were treated
under my supervision. Of these fifteen
can be followed up, and of that number
three are dead. The number of injections
in these cases were one, two and four respec-
tively. Of the remaining twelve patients,
ten received one and two received four
injections. Five of the ten patients
who received one injection developed
abscesses at the site of the injection
and were therefore unsuitable for
further injections."

"The other five patients were not
re-injected, either because they did
not see the improvement they had
been led to expect or because they
had become worse and had lost con-
fidence in Friedmann. As to their
present condition, five of them are
now unchanged and five are worse
than a year ago. One patient who
had four injections, feels well, and
presents signs of an arrested lung-
process, but he has not gained in
weight and has developed few tuber-
culosis process in another part of the
body. The second patient with four
injections has tuberculosis of the knee
joint, and is now decidedly worse than
before. The infiltrate of the fourth
injection broke down and discharged
pus."

"Where abscesses resulted at the
site of the first injection, the vaccine
apparently produced no additional
harmful effect. The disease remained
uninfluenced. Friedmann neglected
to prevent abscess formation, al-
though he claimed to know how. To
be very charitable, one might judge
from one single case, that decided
natural healing tendencies, aided by
common sense treatment, will not be
hindered by the remedy."

In speaking on the subject, "The
Subsequent History of Cases Dis-
charged from Tuberculosis Sanatoria,"
Dr. Charles Bolduan of the New York
department of health, declared that
tuberculosis sanatoria are useless and
constant preaching of fresh air wasted
unless "we bend every effort to
provide suitable remunerative fresh
air employment for the tuberculosis
patients, especially for those discharged
from sanatoria." The same argument
was made by the Rev.

Sidney Goldstein of New York, who
declared that unless arrested cases
were "followed up" the work is ren-
dered useless.

Two methods, by the use of which
surgery was proven of service in the
treatment of tuberculosis, were re-
ported upon by Dr. Edward Archibald
of Montreal. "While modern meth-
ods of climatological, hygienic and
dietetic treatment accomplish a great
deal, particularly in incipient tuber-
culosis," said Dr. Archibald, "there
remains a large number of cases with
more advanced disease for whom
these methods avail little. For a cer-
tain number of such patients, espe-
cially those in whom one lung is the
seat of serious ulcerative lesions,
while the other lung remains prac-
tically sound, operative surgery will
often prove of great service." The
first method suggested by Dr. Arch-
ibald, known as artificial pneumo-

thorax, aims to produce a collapse of
the affected lung through compres-
sion, effected by the introducing into
the chest cavity outside of the lung a
certain amount of nitrogen gas. By
means of this compression the tuber-
culosis lung, being set at rest and
prevented from filling its natural func-
tion, is more readily healed than it
could be under normal conditions.
The second method consists in the re-
moval of the ribs or portions of them,
so that atmospheric pressure may act
upon the lung through the soft, yield-
ing structures of the thoracic mus-
cles, or that the ribs may be allowed
to fall in upon the lung beneath and
so exercise compression.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 8.—
Drawings for the million dollar
George Washington memorial to be
erected in this city are being consid-
ered today. The winning architect
will receive \$1,500.

The memorial will take the form of
a four story building in either Geor-

gian or Italian renaissance style, con-
taining a great auditorium and subor-
dinate meeting rooms.

On the third floor will be rooms
for states which have contributed,
preference being given to the thir-
teen original states.

Massachusetts is expected to con-
tribute \$200,000 as a state fund.
