UNIONS' GROWTH IS BEST IN U. S.

OVER A QUARTER OF A MILLION MORE MEN JOINED TRADE UNIONS HERE LAST YEAR, SAYS WORLD REPORT

LONDON, May 8.—The trade union movement is growing faster in the United States than in any other country in the world, according to the annual report of the International Trade Union Federation.

There was a gain in the aggregate membership of American trade unions last year of 279,377—more than half of the entire world's increase—as against 217,536 in Germany, second on the list, and 39,858 in Belgium, third. Although some of the European

countries show a falling off, owing to the disastrous effects of the Balkan war, the total gain in the nineteen nations represented in the federation is stated to have been 493,466, the net membership being 7,394,461.

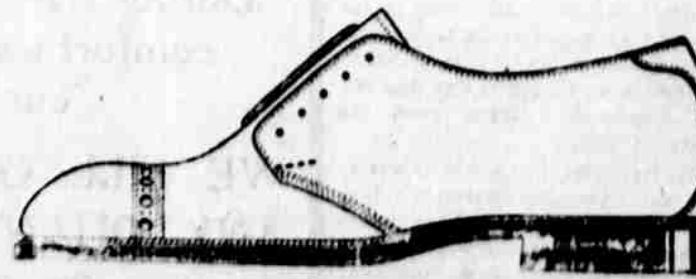
