REGULARS TAKE
SUNDAY'S GAME

SEVEN SCORES ARE PILED UP
BY MORROW'S HOPEFULS, BUT
THE YANNIGANS ARE KALSO-
MINED

Quite a goodly sprinkling of fans
turned out to see the first ball game
on the home grounds Sunday after-
noon, when Morrow's Regulars threw
a "natural" and the Yannigans failed
to make a pass.

Despite the lop-sidedness of a 7-to-0
score, the game furnished several op-
portunities for exercising the vocal
organs of the fans.

Both teams left the barrier in big

evening the boys will go out for prac-
tice, and will probably practice two

end and Browne, Foster and Shive on
the mound, he has good material to
carry him through the season as far
as the battery is concerned.

Say the Liberals Are
Great Savers of Life

United Press Service

LONDON, May 11.—The present
liberal government of Great Britain
is one of the greatest life-saving in-
stitutions in the world, according to
John Burns, member of the cabinet
and president of the board of trade.

In the past seven years, since it
has been in power, he declared in a
speech at South Shields, it has saved
the lives of more than half a million
persons. This is the way he works it
out.

The reduction in the death rate
shows that 545,000 persons are alive

today who, according to the rate for
the preceding seven years, really
ought to be dead. This he ascribes
to the improvement in housing, public
health, and other conditions of life
brought about by the government's
progressive and sympathetic legisla-
tion.

He points out also that the total
pauperism in England and Wales has
diminished by 22 per cent, so that
there are now 114,000 fewer persons
subsisting at the expense of the tax-
payers than there were eight years
ago.
