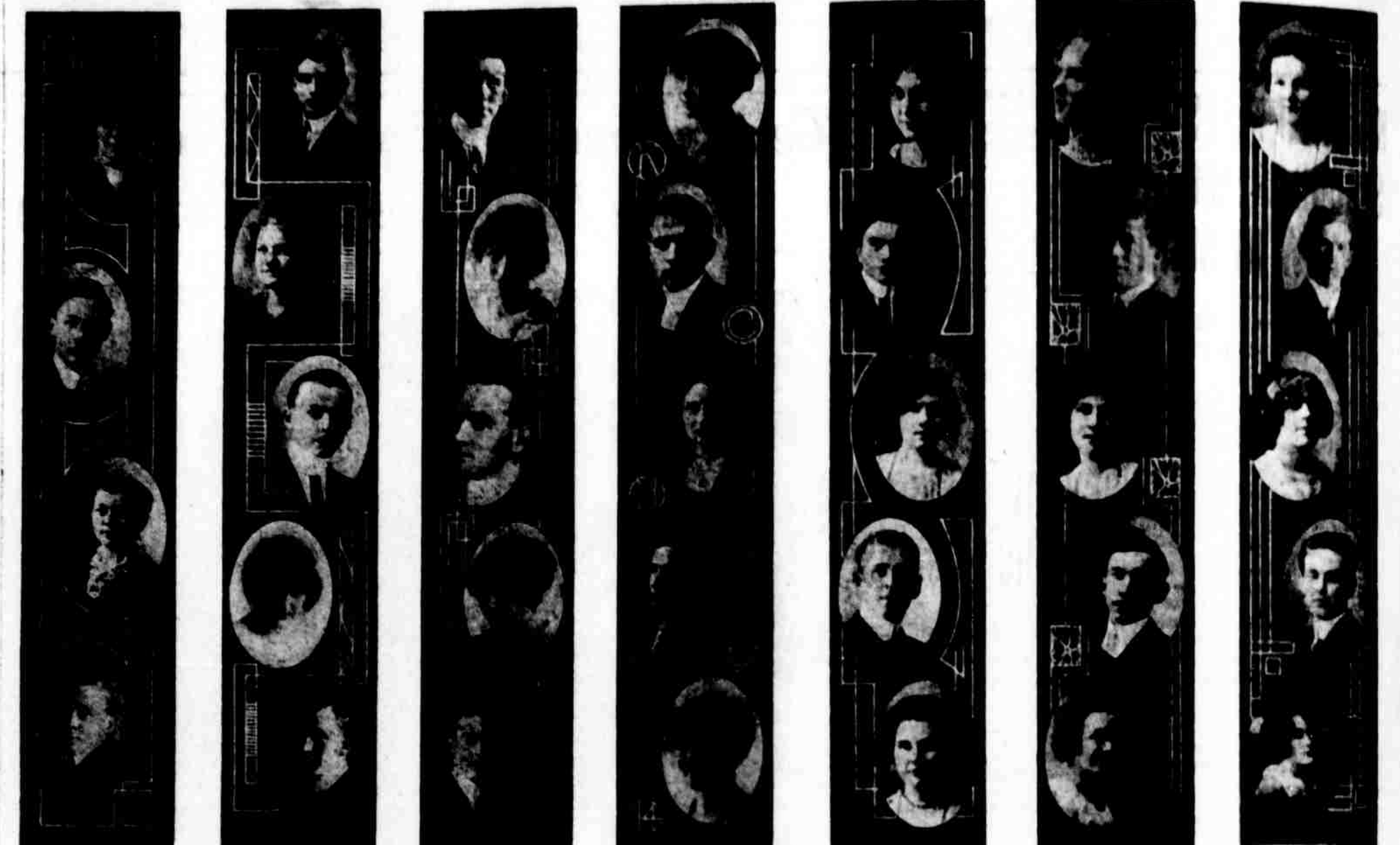

The largest class in the history of
the Klamath county high school will
be graduated from that institution
The diplomas will be presented the
members May 29, at the commence-
ment exercises, which will be held at
the high school.

Friday evening the Senior Class
play, "A Pair of Spectacles," will be
presented at Houston's opera house.
This is a cleverly written comedy,
with amusing situations and bright
dialogue, and the students are letter
perfect in their lines.

The baccalaureate sermon will be
given at the high school auditorium
May 24. Elder S. D. Harlan, pastor
of the Christian church, will address
the graduates.

Dr. C. J. Bushnell, president of the
Pacific University, at Forest Grove,
will address the Senior class at the
commencement exercises on the night
of May 29th. His subject is "The
Challenge of the Twentieth Century
to the Youth of America," and he will
deliver this at a number of com-
mencement exercises this year.

The Senior class has just immor-

talized itself in the history of the
Klamath county high school by pre-
sented the school with a beautiful
pressed stone fountain. This is a
great ornament to the campus, as
the water splashes, and goldfish dis-
port themselves in the limpid depth
of the lower pool. However, it is not
alone by the class roll on the presen-
tation tablet that the class of 1914
has made itself a niche in the school
hall of fame, for in the four years of
study at the high school the class has
been distinguished by scholastic, ath-
letic and social achievement.

In every school activity the mem-
bers of the class of 1914 have
played an active and important part,
and many offices of honor have
been held by the class members.
During the four years, eleven mem-
bers of the class have served as stu-
dent body officers and members of
the athletic cabinet, eight or more
have been connected with the publi-
cation of the annual, four have repre-
sented the school in debate, four have
been members of the band and five of
the orchestra. In the glee club mem-
bership there have been eleven mem-

bers of the class soon to graduate the
school. In athletic events seniors have
also been prominent. Eleven men,
enough to comprise a full team, have
donned football garb and hit the bar
for their alma mater during the last
two years, and the captain of the
"13-14" team was a senior. Five
members have represented the school
in track and field events, five have
won their "K's" in basketball, and
seven made the baseball team.
The class motto is "Carpe Diem."
The class colors are purple and
gold.

Says Movie Film Is
Hurting the Doctors

BERLIN, May 12.—On the ground
that it tended to destroy public con-
fidence in physicians, Herr von Jagow,
president of the Berlin police, recent-
ly prohibited the production of a
moving picture drama entitled "The
Slave of a Woman." The film told a
picture story of a doctor infatuated
with a woman, and in the course of
the drama persuades a titled woman
to submit to an unnecessary opera-
tion which he declares will alone save
her life, in order to get money for
his paramour.

The film concern appealed from the
order of the police. The upper court
has just rendered a decision uphold-
ing the action of the head of police.
The court declared that it was in the

interest of public order and welfare
that confidence in physicians should
not be shaken; that the film in ques-
tion undoubtedly tended to do this,
and that it was the duty of the au-
thorities to prevent such attacks upon
the medical profession.
