SAN FRANCISCO, May 14.—A derby hat formerly owned by the agent of the Adams Express company at Jersey City has been started from here after completing a "deadhead" trip to many of the nation's most important cities.

The journey began at Jersey City when it was adorned with a prepaid tag, with the address in the blank space after "consignee" filled in thus: "Send me anywhere, but I sure

would like to see San Francisco before I get back to New Jersey."

SAM EVANS IS OUT FOR OFFICE

NORTHWESTERN'S EDITOR INFORMS DEMOCRATS THAT HE WILL ACCEPT NOMINATION IF HIS NAME IS WRITTEN IN.

A new eleventh hour political boom has just come to light, by the statement of Sam Evans, that he would accept the democratic nomination for congress if the democrats of the district write his name on the ballot. The announcement in the paper this morning was the first intimation that the majority of Klamath Falls people had of Evans' aspirations, but he stated that he has been repeatedly

urged to come out as a candidate, despite his refusal.

Evans contends that a democratic congressman will be able to accomplish more for this district in congress than a republican, under the present administration. He also contends that the democrats of the district ought not to let the office go to a republican by default. Congressman N. J. Finnott is opposed for the republican renomination.
