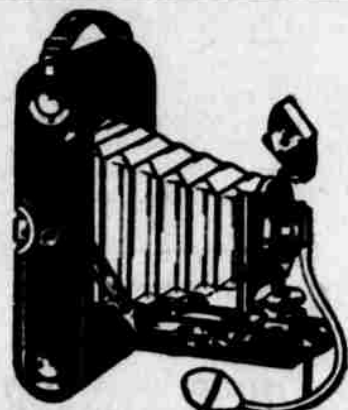

VIENNA RUNNING
PARIS FOR STYLE

AUSTRIAN CAPITAL IS RAPIDLY
ACQUIRING FAME FOR THE DE-
SIGNING OF FEMININE APPAR-
EL OF CLASS

VIENNA, May 15.—That the de-
signing of women's gowns and the
furthering and promoting of styles
and modes which is making Vienna a
rival to Paris, is worthy of high hon-
or and state recognition, was in effect
the decision of Emperor Franz Josef,
by decorating Frau Marie Gelber with
the golden cross of the "Order of
Merit."

Frau Gelber is chief editor of the
magazine "Vienna Modes." The dec-
oration was conferred upon her in
recognition of her indefatigable work
to create "Vienna art" in beautiful
gowns and dresses, which has made
the Viennese women quite independ-
ent of Paris.

MOLASSES SOLD
CHINX AS "HOP"

MONGOLIANS, PAYING FANCY
PRICES FOR ALLEGED SMUG-
GLED OPIUM HAVE NO GROUND
TO COMPLAIN OF SWINDLE

LOS ANGELES, May 15.—Molasses
and port wine is what many Chinese
have bought as opium smuggled into
the United States, according to the
statement of treasury department offi-
cials here today.

Labels of well known opium manu-
facturers in China, it is alleged, have
been forged and pasted upon the
cans, some of which have been sold
for as high as \$50 a can.

Officials said the purchasers, not
daring to report, were compelled to
suffer the loss in silence.

Forty-one cans of the concoction
were seized at Calexico recently. Gov-
ernment chemists detected the imi-
tation.

Counties Have Equal
Advantages at Fair

SALEM, May 15.—Complete revis-
ion of the plan heretofore employed
in conducting the county agricultural
exhibits at the state fair is the salient
feature of the premium list of the
1914 Oregon state fair, which was
transmitted to the state printer today
by Frank Meredith, secretary of the
state fair board.

Heretofore all counties have com-
peted with each other for fixed prizes,
but under the revised plan, the state
has been divided into three districts:
Clatsop, Tillamook, Coos, Curry and
Lincoln counties comprising the first
district; Wasco, Hood River, Colum-
bia, Multnomah, Clackamas, Wash-
ington, Yamhill, Polk, Linn, Benton,
Lane, Douglas, Jackson and Joseph-
ine the second district, and Umatilla,
Sherman, Baker, Walla, Morrow,
Klamath, Lake, Harney, Grant, Mal-
heur, Crook, Wheeler, Gilliam and
Union the third.

Premiums are offered pro rata for
each district, the amount of money to
be divided in each one being based on
the number of counties entered, and
the basis fixed being \$100 for each
exhibit that qualifies.

All competing counties from each
district will draw pro rata, in the
same proportion as the one winning
first, according to the number of
points scored. An exhibit must score
at least 66 points out of 100 to par-
ticipate in the division of the money.

In addition to the money pro rated
\$90 will be divided, 50 to the first,
\$25 to second and \$15 to the third,
among the three counties of each dis-

trict scoring the highest number of
points.

Fifteen dollars to the first, \$10 to
the second and \$5 to the third will
also be awarded to three counties
scoring the highest beauty exhibit,
and for this premium Marion county
and for this premium alone Marion
county will compete.

The livestock classification has also
been revised so as to conform to that
adopted by the North Pacific Fair
Association, and exhibitors will be en-
abled to show their animals in the
same classes throughout the circuit.

Four hundred and fifty dollars
more is offered in the sheep classi-
fication, and the swine department is
offering \$216 for Tamworths for the
first time. In the county agricultural
exhibit it is also possible to draw
\$2,000 more than during the 1912
fair.
