OUR WEEKLY SERMON

"Loyalty"

"Whither thou goest, I will go; and where thou lodgest, I will lodge; thy people shall be my people, and thy God shall be my God."—Ruth 1:16.

These words have the ring of loyalty. They came from a loyal heart. Loyalty is a subject that our best American people have had in mind during the past week. As on Arbor Day we plant trees in the soil, so on Decoration Day we plant loyalty in the souls of our people.

Loyalty is not as a garment, which may be put on one day and off the next, but it belongs to the very fiber of the soul. A person who is loyal to one cause will be loyal to another; a person who is disloyal to one cause will be disloyal to another. A person who is absolutely loyal to one friend will be loyal to all his friends. A person who is disloyal to one friend, will be disloyal to others. George Washington was loyal to America because he had loyalty woven into the texture of his soul. Arnold was a traitor to the American cause because he had treason woven into the very texture of his soul.

Religious loyalty is not in its nature different from secular loyalty. The Christian who is loyal to his friends will also be loyal to his Lord, but if he is not loyal to his friends, neither will he be loyal to his Lord.

The church member who has an excuse for not being loyal to his church is deceiving only himself with his excuse. The true reason for his disloyalty is not in the excuse which he puts forward, but in the treason which is to be found in the fiber of his soul.

Jesus said: "He that is faithful in that which is least is faithful also in much." The word faithful here has the same significance as the word loyal. True faithfulness and true loyalty alike depend upon the texture of the soul, and not upon outside circumstances.

We are now approaching the season that will test the loyalty of the Christian men and women of Klamath Falls. A few people who are absolutely loyal to their Lord are worth more to His cause than a multitude who are lacking in loyalty. A person who is a professing Christian may turn his back upon the church to try to gain favor with the world, but this will only cause the world to despise him, for God has put something into the soul of every human being that makes him despise a traitor.

Loyal Christians are just as essential to the cause of Christ as loyal soldiers were to the cause of freedom at the time of the Revolutionary War. Great things can be accomplished by a very small band, if every one is absolutely loyal.

Basque Is Coming Back Into Fashion



French houses are predicting the basque for the not distant future, and while it is a little early to say whether it will be universally adopted, the costume of the sketch looks very much like a forerunner. It was worn at one of the races held near Paris very recently. The long tunic of the skirt, which reaches to within three or four inches of the skirt proper, is extremely full and is indicative of the shorter and wider skirt which may soon become popular. The effect of this tunic is very new and smart. The material used for the costume was a very soft and light quality duvetyn in a dark shade of blue. A little roll collar of white organdie finished the neck and a touch of the same material was introduced on the cuffs. The only trimming was a half dozen medium sized black buttons, which started at the V-shaped neck and extended almost the length of the waist, and this was pulled down loosely over the hips and gave somewhat the effect of the loose girdles we are now wearing.

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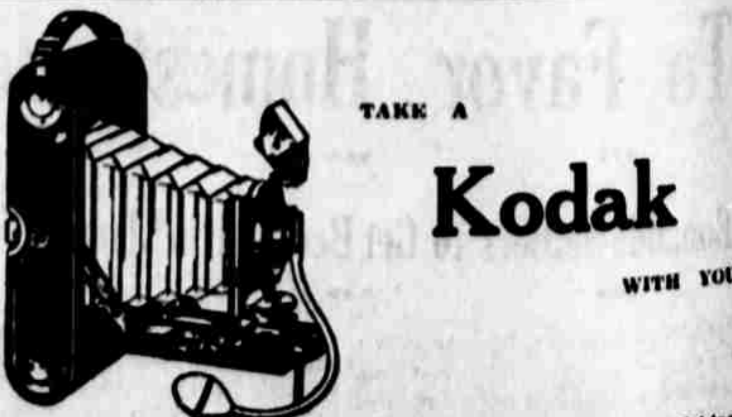
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
