Bob Says, "Water the Lawn Once Each Week"

Just a few words about lawns. We nearly all make mistakes in regard to watering and cutting lawns. Any established lawn does not require water more than once a week, and in very windy, drying weather, perhaps twice a week.

The two hours allotted for watering is sufficient for the ordinary 30x60 foot lawn, and watered that time

one night will do for a week. It is unnatural and uncalled for to sprinkle every evening.

In regard to cutting, cut your lawn twice a week, leaving the clippings on the lawn. These work down and form a mulch which retains the moisture around the roots of the grass.

HOBSON FAMOUS SIXTEEN YEARS

IT WAS JUNE 2, 1898, THAT CONGRESSMAN, WITH SEVEN MEN, SUNK THE MERRIMAC TO BOTTOM—THE CERVERA'S FLEET

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 2.—Officials at the navy department today recalled that exactly sixteen years ago Lieutenant Richmond P. Hobson and seven enlisted men steered the collier Merrimac into the narrow neck of Santiago Bay and under fire from the great guns of the frowning fortress, sank the boat in an attempt to bottle up Admiral Cervera in the inner harbor.

Although the purpose for which the Merrimac was sunk was not successful, the fact was considered one of the greatest exhibitions of individual heroism of the war.

The seven men who were chosen for the duty were D. Montague, chief master at arms; George Charotte, gunner's mate third class; R. Clausen, O. Dieman and J. E. Murphy, coxswains; G. E. Phillips, machinist, and F. Kelly, water tender.

Sir Conan Doyle and Wife Talking to Detective Burns



When Sir Conan Doyle and Lady Doyle arrived in this country the first person to greet them was William J. Burns, the detective.

"Are you going to give the novelist some ideas for stories?" Mr. Burns was asked.

"I guess it will be the other way about," said he.

The best known detective in the United States, if not in the world, and the author of "Sherlock Holmes," who are old friends, had a long talk. When asked what he thought about the militant suffragettes in England he said:

"The next thing that will happen to the militants is a lynching. The public is tired of their operations, and its resentment will take the form of mob hangings. The police have had their hands full on several occasions, protecting the destructive wild women. I expect to hear of a lynching any day, or I will not be surprised when it comes."

Will Observe "Road Bee Day" in Michigan

LANSING, Mich., June 2.—Under proclamation of Governor Ferris—the first of its kind ever penned by a Michigan executive—citizens all over the state will observe "road bee day."

In many cities and towns, banks, business places and factories will be closed for the day and thousands of merchants and bankers will work side by side with laborers and factory men for the improvement of the state's highways.

The state highway commissioner, who endorsed the governor's plans for "road bee day," realized the necessity of effective organization if

the results hoped for were to be accomplished, and he accordingly prepared and caused to be spread broadcast over the state, a bulletin setting forth effective methods of road building, repair and improvement.

His suggestions were expected to be generally followed. In nearly every school district in the state, a "road boss" was appointed, and under his direction thousands of citizens planned to work loyally throughout the day.

More than \$7,000,000 was expended for the improvement of the 70,000 miles of rural highways in Michigan last year and another large sum will be appropriated for the same purpose during 1914.

WYLAND-HUNT TRIAL THURSDAY
