APPRENTICESHIP SET AT ONE YEAR

INDUSTRIAL WELFARE COMMISSION REJECTS THE REQUEST OF MERCHANTS TO EXTEND THIS A COUPLE OF YEARS

PORTLAND, JUNE 5.—The Industrial Welfare commission has decided not to accept the recommendations of the committee of the mercantile employees to reopen the question of increasing the length of apprenticeship for women workers.

The commission had fixed the length of time for apprenticeship at one year, while the recommendation was made that it be increased from eighteen months to two years. The meeting was to have been held some time ago, but owing to the absence of Rev. Edwin V. O'Hara, who has been out of the city, it was not held until today.

A large number of business houses and manufacturing concerns will have to abide by this ruling.

Anti-Cigarette League Adjourns
LAKE MOHONK, N. Y., June 5.—Plans for a more active national campaign against the cigarette were completed at the conference of the Anti-Cigarette League of America, which closed a three day meeting here today. This was the first annual conference of the organization, which has grown from a small band of reformers into a national society with the slogan "save the boys and preserve their health, education and efficiency." Statistics presented during the conference here showed that in certain communities the habitual use of tobacco in some form has reached a maximum of 90 per cent among the boys in the graded schools.

Shamrock IV. Launched With Great Ceremony

WITH AN AMATEUR HELMSMAN OF WONDERFUL ABILITY, AND "THE BEST BOAT EVER SENT ACROSS THE ATLANTIC," SIR THOMAS LIPTON THINKS HIS CHANCES ARE BRIGHT FOR LIFTING THE AMERICA'S CUP, ESPECIALLY AS THIS WILL BE THE THIRTEENTH TIME THE TROPHY HAS BEEN RACED FOR

PORTSMOUTH, England, June 5. In the presence of a distinguished company of British sportsmen, statesmen and society women, the Shamrock IV, Sir Thomas Lipton's latest challenger for the America cup was recently launched from the yard of Camper & Nicholson, at Gosport.

Later, on board his magnificent steam yacht Erin, the millionaire sportsman-ten-merchant's guests drank enthusiastically—but not too—to the success of his fourth attempt to win the Blue Ribbon of the Sea.

"I am making no rash predictions," said Sir Thomas just before the gracefully lined craft slipped into the water, "but I honestly feel that my chances this time are on the winning side. I know that this will be the best boat that ever crossed the Atlantic to try for the cup. Moreover, luck ought to be with me, considering that this is the thirteenth race for that trophy."

"I have been preparing for the event for seventeen years. I have learned something valuable each of the three times I lost with the previous Shamrocks, and the boat we are now launching embodies not only the results of my own experience and observation, but the ripened fruits of the marvelous talents of that prince of designers, Charles E. Nicholson."

The work of rigging the Shamrock IV will require about a week, after which she will be put on her tuning up trials. These will continue until about the middle of July, most of the races being pulled off in the Solent, the stretch of water separating the Isle of Wight from the main land.

The present challenger is the first from this side to be constructed with a centerboard. This plate drops ten feet when let down, making her total draft when rigged and manned nearly twenty-four feet. Another innovation.

tion is the fact that she is built largely of wood, the previous Shamrocks being entirely of metal.

Laid on a framework of navalium, a recently patented metal composition, there are two wooden skins throughout—in places three—the outer layer being mahogany. Her mast is of hollow wood, the longest of that type ever constructed. A duplicate mast will be shipped to America, to be available in event of accident.

The amount of canvas to be carried is still a secret. Sir Thomas intimates that the spread will astonish the yachting world.

For the first time a Lipton challenger will be commanded by an amateur helmsman, but yachting experts regard W. P. Burton as one of the most skillful in the world. He certainly has no peers in Great Britain.

In his yachting career, extending over thirty years, he has sailed more than a thousand races, and has been the owner of several cup-winning boats. His total wins have been 235 firsts and 140 other prizes, including two king's cups and the international fifteen-meter cup—the blue ribbon of fifteen-meter racing in Europe—which he won three years in succession.

Westinghouse Plant May Have Walkout

PITTSBURGH, June 5.—The plants of the Westinghouse company in East Pittsburgh, employing from 16,000 to 20,000 men, are threatened with a general strike. When the plant opened this morning 2,300 men of the 7 o'clock shift gathered at the gates of the factories and announced that they would not go to work until the company met certain demands that had been made.

The strikers comprise at least 20 per cent of the strength claimed by the officials of the Allegheny Congenial Industrial Union, the organization of Westinghouse employees.

The leaders of the strike predict that the other shifts will follow suit, and that 10,000 would be out tonight. This is the first showing of the strength of the new union, which is reported to have surprised the Westinghouse officials.
