English Unions Fight I. W. W. Organization

MANCHESTER, England, June 8. Thirteen nations were represented at the opening session today, in the Central Public Library of Blackpool, of the ninth congress of the International Federation of Textile Workers' Association.
Among the various important subjects for discussion the liveliest interest probably will be centered in the question of whether the Industrial Workers of the World are eligible to affiliation with the International Federation in the same way as the American Federation of Labor.
Some of the more conservative unions are strongly opposed to admitting the I. W. W. on account of its avowed policy of syndicalism. There is also sharp division of opinion on the question of raising the legal school age of children. On the continent most of the unions aim at restricting child labor, instead of defending it, as is done by the cotton workers' organizations in Great Britain.
The congress is expected to protest vigorously against the excessive and continually increasing expenditure for armaments and to declare for international arbitration.

Gotham Department Stores Closing Early During Summer

Biggest Shops in Biggest Cities Will Remain Closed All Day Saturday, and Will Be Open Other Days From 9 to 5

NEW YORK, June 8.—Old Father Knickerbocker is coming to realize that all work and no play makes Jack a dull boy—and the same may be said for Jill, and Jack and Jill's parents and grand parents and uncle and aunts and cousins. That is, the City of New York, and the merchant princes, bankers and railway magnates of the city have come to know that their employes must have recreation. Accordingly some of the largest department stores in New York have agreed to close their shops on Saturday as well as Sundays during the hottest part of the summer. Also they will not open until 9 o'clock on other days, and will close at 5.

Such an arrangement will give the shop girls a seven-hour day and two entire days of rest each week. With a five-day week and "banking hours" on their working days, the department store employes will have no long hours to complain of, and the fictionists and playwrights will have to go elsewhere for their fagged and down-trodden heroines.
The theater and moving picture managers and the purveyors of entertainment at Coney and other seaside resorts greeted the department stores' announcement with joy. It means a harvest to them. With the shop people having two whole days each week for recreation, the amusement men figured that their receipts would be largely increased.

For several years Saturday afternoon has been a half holiday in downtown New York. Wall street and the financial district, the banks, railroad offices and such establishments have closed at noon Saturday, and their employes have had plenty of rest. It is the opinion of some that here, as in England, Saturday will in time become a general holiday, with every-

thing except amusement enterprises and necessary establishments, such as drug stores, and the like, will close two days in each week.
It may or may not be true that employers of labor are becoming more humane and thinking more for the happiness of their employes, but it is a fact that they realize that recreation is absolutely necessary. It may be their motives are calculating, but what of that, so long as the working people get the benefit. It is a certainty that the best workers are the happy and contented workers, the healthy and strong workers. A man and a woman may be compelled to work long hours six days a week, but that man or woman, while he or she puts in more time, will actually do less work in the long run than the man or woman who has shorter hours and periods for recreation. The first workers are so tired and discontented that their efficiency is lowered, while the latter through their rest hours have so much to interest them and take their minds from the factory or store that they come back full of enthusiasm and accomplish greater results.
There is now a movement on foot among the churches of New York to establish playgrounds at every house of worship for the children of the neighborhood. That the children and the grown-ups in the congested greater city must have rest and air and fun if they are to be useful citizens is coming to be realized more and more, to the general benefit of all New Yorkers.
