Peterson Is Named as Child Labor Inspector

County School Superintendent Fred Peterson has just been appointed deputy inspector of child labor by the Child Labor Commission. He has power to inspect places where minors under 16 years of age are employed, and to issue permits.

Under the ruling of the Industrial Welfare Commission, no girl under 15 years of age can be employed more than eight hours and twenty minutes a day unless a permit has been secured from the commission by the employers, permitting an extension of time. Boys can be employed up to ten hours.

A synopsis of the other provisions follow:

No child under 14 years of age may work in a factory, work shop, mercantile establishment, store, business office, restaurant, bakery, hotel or an apartment house.

No child under 15 years of age may work during the school term unless he has graduated from the grammar grades and is over 14 years of age.

No child under 16 may work in the telegraph, telephone or public messenger service.

No child under 16 may work after 6 p. m. nor before 7 a. m.

No child under 18 years of age may work in the telegraph, telephone or public messenger service between the hours of 10 p. m. and 5 a. m.

No child under 16 may be employed at any labor specified above unless he has secured an age and schooling certificate (working permit) from the Child Labor Commission.

Children between the ages of 9 and 15 years must go to school the entire term, and between the ages of 15 and 16 unless legally employed. To be legally employed a child must be over 15, through the 6A grade and in good physical condition, and must have secured an age and schooling certificate as provided in Section 9. This certificate can be secured at the office of the commission at 250 1/2 Third street, rooms 19-20. Child

must be accompanied by a parent, guardian or custodian, who shall swear to an affidavit as to the child's age.

Age and schooling certificates must be filed with the employer as long as the child is employed by him, and returned to the child when he quits that employment.

During summer vacations the Child Labor Commission may issue vacation permits to children between the ages of 12 and 14 years for any work that does not affect the health or morals of the children.

Both employer and parent are liable to prosecution for violation of the law.

Chickens Start Accidents

At Walton, Ind., a farmer brought in a crate of chickens for shipment to Chicago. The crate broke and the chickens fluttered out with much squawking. This scared a horse, which started out to run away. The farmer fell out of the wagon, and another man was badly hurt trying to stop the runaway horse. An aged woman, witnessing the accident, fell off a porch and was badly hurt. A little girl hearing her screams turned her head and lost two fingers in the machinery of a cream separator.

New Jersey has a 14-year limit for factories only; in other occupations children of any age may work outside of school hours.

Captain Anderson of the Collier Storstad



The photographer caught Captain Thomas Anderson of the collier Storstad, which sank the Empress of Ireland, just after he had anchored at a pier in Montreal. The captain would have nothing to say as to the cause of the accident. The company which owned his vessel had issued a statement, and he would not add to it. However, it was said he resented statements made by Captain Kendall of the Ireland before the coroner at Rimouski, where the inquest was held. According to Pilot Nault, who brought the Storstad here from Quebec, Captain Anderson made this remark:

"Captain Kendall's statement of what occurred when the Empress of Ireland was sunk is a lot of lies."

It was denied for the captain of the Storstad that he backed away after the crash. It was also asserted for him that his ship was virtually at a standstill when the collision occurred. The Storstad's owners also insisted that, from the positions of the vessels before the fog bank came between them, the Storstad had the right of way. On the other hand, Alex C. Radley, chief bos'n's mate, who was on the bridge of the Empress with Captain Kendall, says that the Storstad was going at the rate of between seven and eight miles an hour. Captain Kendall said that when he saw both the green and red lights of the Storstad about a ship's length away—which showed him that she was coming directly for him—he ordered "full speed ahead," with his helm hard to port, hoping to clear the prow of the collier.

Movie Men Finishing Their Film Work Here

After suffering vicissitudes galore, including the wreck of their motor-boat on a mountain top, many miles from water, Managing Director E. A. Salisbury and L. M. Hutt, camera man of the Educational Film company, Warden J. J. Furber, William L. Finley, in charge of biological survey work for the state fish and game commission and the government, Herman T. Bohman, a noted bird photographer and ornithological lecturer, and a motion picture camera man in the state's employ returned late Sunday from Clear Lake Bird Preserve, where they spent nine days.

Although there was much rain and snow, and a high wind every day which rocked their little boat, the party succeeded in securing some splendid pictures. The pelicans nested a month earlier on Clear Lake than on Lower Klamath, and the pelican pictures were completed, over 1,000 feet being taken of the birds feeding the young and all phases of their life.

"Owing to the difficulty of reaching Clear Lake, the birds there have been little disturbed," said Mr. Salisbury this morning. "For this reason there are many times the number there are on the Lower Lake."

"Two miles up Willow Creek we secured some fine pictures of a buzzard rookery, even to the many squabbles and fights among the birds."

We filmed a colony of 200 or more grebe on the swamp at this creek, and also got films of colonies of Forrester tern, black tern, seagulls, night heron and many other birds. It was too early to get the Caspian heron, but we will catch these on Tule Lake later."

Among other discomforts, the party experienced five snow days and much rain and wind. The sixty miles over rough, wet mountain road from the lake to Bonanza proved too much for the truck hauling the motor boat, and the spokes all fell out of the hubs, leaving the boat stranded on the mountain. The motor boat will be brought down when the roads are better.

This afternoon the party went to the Upper Lake swamp at the mouth of Williamson River, to get the last of the duck and shorebird pictures taken there some time ago. Within the next few days Salisbury and Hutt will be through with their work here, unless they decide to stay for the Rodco.
