Name Committees; Street Improvement Matters Up

there was considerable blasting to be done on the street, and that an inspector would not be needed for a month. The petition was tabled for the present.

The ordinance previously introduced and passed to its second reading, authorizing a contract with J. H. Garrett for the improvement of Third street, was adopted.

The Eleventh street ordinance, providing for the improvement and paving of that street, was adopted. This ordinance was held up by the old council awaiting a report from the street committee as to whether the reclamation service would construct a bridge across the canal, if the improvement was made. It was argued that the government was under contract with the city to construct

bridges wherever necessary, and that their action would not in any way affect the ordinance. The property owners are anxious that the starting of the work be hastened, so that it can be completed this year.

An ordinance was introduced by Matthews and passed to its second reading providing for establishing a grade on Eldorado street, between Portland and Manzanita.

A resolution was introduced by Matthews and passed setting June 29 as the date for hearing objections to the proposed assessment roll for the improvement of Eighth street.

An ordinance was introduced and passed to its second reading, establishing a grade on Eleventh street and Worden avenue and Donald street. These grades were already made by the city engineers previous to letting the contract for the improvement of the street.

Matthews called attention of the council to the absence of C. E. Meldrum, electrical inspector, from the city, and the necessity of having some one appointed to the office. He recommended Fred Bremer, Mayor Nicholas stated that he had received a letter from Meldrum, who notified him that Mr. Bremer would complete his report for him, and stating that he probably would not be able to return soon to attend to the office, and recommending that Fred Bremer be appointed in his place. Mr. Bremer will be asked to furnish the report, and an appointment will probably be made at the next meeting of the council.

Oppose Pulpit Politicians

Through W. D. Lewis, president, the Farmers' Union of Texas has inaugurated a fight against preachers taking part in politics. The union states that 75 per cent of the preachers of the state are on the payrolls of farmers; the farmers' money has built 10,000 churches and the farmers have contributed \$5,000,000 per annum for support of the churches, consequently farmers have a right to expect preachers to devote their time to church work, and not to politics. They oppose members of churches voting tickets handed them by the pastors. The report says it is important that pulpits be driven out of the pulpit and that real preachers be forced into the pulpits.

Tourist Trimming Business at Juarez Slumps Off Badly

Curio Men, Gamblers and Bull Fight Promoters Are in Dire Danger of Having to Go to Work for a Living

JAUREZ, Mexico, May 30.—(By mail to New York).—Have a heart, if you will, for the down-trodden people, the war-riddled Pacific and the thousands of other sufferers in bleeding Mexico, but save a tear for the luckless curio dealer, gambler, the dance hall proprietor and the bull-fight promoter of the Mexican border town. In the hoarse voice of a prominent American gent of this town: "An odder mont' of dis an' I'll have to go to work."

The bottom blew out of the business of entertaining and trimming American tourists, drummers and live plain visitors in Juarez when the war scare struck El Paso and the genuine men who look after that profitable trade have room for lament.

The first dash of cold water was the order that street cars should not cross the international bridge from El Paso after 9 o'clock at night.

This precaution was taken to prevent the inebriated Americans from El Paso mixing with inebriated Mexicans, the authorities of both towns working on the theory that man commonly does not become warlike along the border until after 9 p. m.

Proprietors of dance halls on the Juarez side were the first ones hit. Ordinarily their amusement places were thronged with gold-lined Amer-

icans from Florida to Texas, who came to see the famous dance properly and in propriety dressed, and who were convinced that El Paso in the bracing air of the morning

The talk of trouble threw a big scare into them.

More wild talk of a row with the constitutionalists and the curio dealers got their tourists fighting shy of Juarez even in the daylight and abandoning nearly altogether the nightly joy rides by sight seeing autos from El Paso.

The little hall ceased to spin about the roulette wheel as frequently as in the past; the gambling fraternity "got the dumps," and the bull fight promoters found advertising the game on the American side less remunerative.
