riders only)—Purse \$90; first, each day, \$20; second, each day, \$10. Conditions—Only horses actually owned by Indians to compete. Riders to be Indians. Indian costumes to be worn. Winning horse of first day not to compete until final day. Second prize will not be paid unless three horses compete. Horses to compete each day unless excused by management. Prizes will not be paid unless this condition is complied with.

In addition to competitive events exhibitions will be given each day of trick riding, roping, bull riding, fancy rope work, Roman riding and riding bucking horses by lady riders.

In addition to the cash prizes arranged by the committee there will be many valuable trophies offered in nearly every event by the business houses of Klamath Falls.

Following are the general conditions governing all contestants and events:

Management assumes no responsibility for accidents to stock or contestants while on the ground.

No contestant under the influence of liquor will be allowed to compete in any event.

The judges' decision in all matters of contest or protest must be final. No rowdiness or cruelty will be tolerated.

In all cash prizes money will be paid to the rider unless other arrangements are made with the management.

All contestants must sign entry blank for events in which they desire to compete and agree to be governed by and abide by the conditions governing the show and different events.

Contestants must wear their numbers in full view on their back at all times while on the grounds.

Contestants must remain at the places provided by the management and be ready for their event. Events will be called as arranged by the management. Contestants not ready will be denied the right to compete.

Contestants will be ruled out by the starter or judges for refusal to obey rules and orders.

All contestants must at all times while on the grounds wear full range costumes consisting of chaps and spurs.

No one will be permitted in the arena or on the track excepting those participating in event taking place at the time.

Prize moneys will be paid each evening excepting in three-day events.

All deposits required will be held by the management until after the show.

Feed for stock will be furnished by the management on the grounds.

SAYS NO FREIGHT STANDS IN YARDS

SOUTHERN PACIFIC AGENT SAYS RECORDS WILL PROVE THAT THE ALLEGATION MADE IS NOT CORRECT

According to S. J. Bailey, local agent for the Southern Pacific, the members of the Klamath Chamber of Commerce have been misinformed regarding freight in the local yards.

"With reference to the handling of freight at the depot, I desire to say that the statement made in the Northwestern this morning, that cars of freight often stand for ten days before being unloaded, is absolutely false, and further, I can substantiate this with records which will readily disprove such statement," said Mr. Bailey.

"In fact, there cannot be found in our records, since 1911, a case where merchandise cars were not unloaded within three days after being received, and such cases are exceptionally rare.

"Monday night last we received ten cars of merchandise freight, one of the largest, if not the largest, receipts for any one day within the last two years; extra help was employed on Tuesday, and those ten cars will be unloaded today (Wednesday) by 3 o'clock, in time to make delivery. This is practically the second day after receipt, as the freight train arrives during the night, and this is the manner in which all of our extra large receipts are handled.

"Regarding the freight train service: Considering the fact that there is not nearly enough business to justify a daily freight train on this branch, we are endeavoring to give the very best possible service with the tri-weekly train. We often hold the train on the morning it goes west, to get car loads of stock which have been made ready in the evening before or at night after our switch train has quit work.

"We also carry in daily on the evening passenger train merchandise freight in a large baggage car which has been assigned to this special service, so that perishable and important freight is transferred at Weed and brought to Klamath Falls without delay there."
