Sporting Expert Picks Macks
and Giants to Figure in Race

Giants and Pirates Look Best in the National League, and
Athletics and Senators Are the Class
in the American Circuit

NEW YORK, June 11.—Unless the
dope is all wrong, it is now generally
conceded it will be New York or Pitts-
burg in the National League and
Philadelphia or Washington in the
American.

The law of precedents appears to be
the only thing at this writing, against
which McGraw must buck. No team
in the National League has ever won
four straight league pennants. Some-
times back Fred Clark and his Pirates
were headed for their fourth suc-
cessive streamer. The Giants scuttled
the Corsair crew. Now the Pittsburgh-
ers are doing their damndest to return
the compliment, but, though Clark
has a grand little team, up to early in
June it hadn't been there in the
pinch.

The first real, tearing clash
with the Giants late in May, when
New York fairly routed the Pirates,
and then the smearing of the latter got
at the hands of Charlie Herrig's res-
uscitated Cincinnatians, was an ex-
hibition of the heart the Pittsburgh
aggregation hasn't got or at least
didn't have up to that time, and which
is essential to running in front at the
close of the 154-game schedule.

There was no other possible alibi.
The Clark crew was in prime shape.
It had ripped its way through all the
other teams it had met. It had
shown everything except what it could
do when it bucked above-the-average
class. When that grade of class tore
into Pittsburgh in the shape of the
Giants, the erstwhile irresistible force
was halted, stopped and stayed. And

that's the dope in the National
League. But it's pure dope.

New for the fireworks in the Amer-
ican. What follows is not for Wash-
ington to read. Everybody in the
Capital has already picked out just
where they're going to set when, in
their own minds, the Senators meet
the National League winners next fall.
Any Washingtonian who reads this
won't believe it. But it's DOPE.

It's perfectly true that Clark Griffith
has Walter Johnson. There is
also Mile-a-Minute Milan, Base-Grab-
ber Gandil and others of their ilk, not
to mention George McBride, who sel-
dom causes any sparks, but who gen-
erally is conceded to be the greatest
shortstop in the game today. But
(and we must hedge once more be-
hind the dope alibi) according to dope
Connie Mack has shown the class he
totes about the country with him.
With the exception of his pitching
staff, which had not come up to ex-
pectations early this month, he has
the same old crowd, doing the same
old stunts.

Thus this Washington-Philadelphia
argument simmers down to a compar-
ison of the Griffithian-Mackian pitch-
ing departments. Bender is far from
gone, and there may be quite a few
worrying splinters left in Plank, but
neither is what he used to be. Mack
must depend on his younger pitchers,
Bush, Shawkey, Pennock, et al, for
the brunt of his battle. Griffith has
the winning Walter, Ayres, Shaw and
Engle, who have shown more stuff
than the young Mack twirlers.

All in all, it must be conceded to
the rabid Washington fan that the
Washington-Philadelphia fight for the
first place should furnish as pretty a

knock-down-and-drag-out as has ever
been staged in either league.

Our golfers still have a chance to
get back at the Britishers, but even
if they don't, Francis Ouimet will carry
home with him and wear for one
year the French title. After the
young man's drubbing, with the drub-
bing given the other American golfers
at Sandwich, he crossed the channel
and led the field in France. The open
championship in England furnishes
another try for Ouimet and the oth-
ers. Here's hoping that when they
beard Vardon and Ray and the other
golfing lions in their homes, the
Stars and Stripes will have better
luck. To beat Vardon and Ray a sec-
ond time will be more of a triumph
than to have won at Sandwich.

The "Sport of Kings" is far from
dead in Little Old New York and
vicinity. This has been demonstrated
at Belmont Park. Twelve months ago
even the most sanguine could see
nothing in the way of a come-back for
the racing game. If the sport is kept
in the wholesome condition in which
it started, the "good old days" should
return.

And speaking of come-backs, Cor-
nell has done something in athletics
this year. The winning of the Inter-
collegiate at Harvard, which meant
permanent possession of the coveted
championship cup, was indeed a tri-
umph. It was another triumph for
Trainer Jack Sweeney and his meth-
ods. Cornell has also shown her
power on the diamond and on water.
From present indications, the Ithaca
should bring home the bacon at
Poughkeepsie.

More than 50,000 troops, represen-
tative of all the great nations of the
world, are expected to participate in
the greatest military tournament ever
held, upon the grounds of the Pan-
ama-Pacific exhibition in San Francisco
next year. The invitation extended
by the war department of the United
States to the foreign nations to send
troops to an international military en-
campment is being heartily received,
and for the first time in history the
troops of more than three nations will
assemble for maneuvers during time
of peace.

The Union Oil company of Califor-
nia is establishing distributing plants
at many cities in Oregon.

An international fleet of more than
200 vessels, including representative
types of battleships from the navies
of all the great maritime nations, will
gather at Hampton Roads in January,
1915, and proceed upon a cruise
through the Panama canal to San
Francisco harbor, reaching their des-
tination early in March, 1915, and
shortly after the formal opening of
the Panama-Pacific exposition.

More than 220 conventions, at
which more than 5,000,000 accredited
delegates are expected to assemble,
will meet at San Francisco during the
Panama-Pacific exposition in 1915.

WHITE BREAD

Sponge Method

Try the following recipe prepared by Professor Joseph Becker,

Perkins' Resignation
Demanded by Bullmoose

NEW YORK, June 11.—Ames Pin-
chot, a member of the state and
county central committees, has pub-
lished a 4,000 word letter, in which
he demands that George Perkins, the
chairman of the party's national ex-
ecutive committee, withdraw abso-
lutely from the direction of the par-
ty's affairs "for the good of the
party."

The letter has been sent to Per-
kins, Colonel Roosevelt, Senator Dixon
and other leaders of the party. As
yet, Perkins has not replied.

"A situation exists within the pro-
gressive party which must be ter-
minated before the party can command
popular support," says the letter in
beginning.

"The situation I refer to is the ele-
ment in our party leadership headed

by Perkins, which favors protection
of private monopoly in American in-
dustry, and which, since the party's
organization, has been taking active
steps to commit the party to that
policy."

Pinchot charges Perkins with at-
tempting to prevent the 1912 con-
vention from endorsing the Sherman
anti-trust law, adding that when the
resolution was voted and the con-
vention affirmed such an endorsement,
it was strangely stricken out of the ver-
sion of the platform furnished the
press.

"I do not say that Perkins had any-
thing to do with this expurgation,"
says the Pinchot letter. "But I do say
that if it had not been for Perkins'
fight against the Sherman act, the
party would never have been led into
a false, indefensible position."

Local Bankers After
Next State Meeting

W. H. Bennett, vice president of the
First State and Savings bank, and
Leslie Rogers, cashier of the First
National bank, will leave Sunday for
Madford to attend the meeting of the
State Bankers Association.

An invitation is to be extended to
the bankers to come to Klamath Falls
next year, and an effort will be made
to secure the annual meeting for this
city.

Denmark, Dominican Republic, Ecua-
dor, France, Guatemala, Haiti, Hol-
land, Honduras, Italy, Japan, Liberia,
Mexico, New Zealand, Nicaragua, Nor-
way, Panama, Persia, Peru, Portugal,
Salvador, Siam, Spain, Sweden, Tah-
iti, Uruguay and Venezuela.
