## Tumalo Land Is for Settlers Only--West

SALEM, June 12.—The state has about 200 acres of good land in one of the best irrigation projects in the country, the Tumalo project, in Crook county, now ready for entry.

"But no one except actual settlers need apply," is the warning of Governor West. "The land is not for speculators."

He said those who desire to get a piece of the land, which is now supplied with water for irrigation, should get in touch with Project Engineer O. Laurgaard at Laldlaw. The water rights are to be sold at a very reasonable price, to be paid in yearly installments.

The desert land board has authorized the sale of water to private land owners in the project, providing they sign contracts for the water within ninety days. About 5,000 acres in the units now ready for opening are pri-

vately owned, and the state is willing to furnish water for that land at approximately \$40 an acre. The board also ordered that where the settler was not able to make the first payment at this time, the payment could be deferred and spread over the subsequent nine annual payments. The settlers have been waiting so long for water that most of them are pretty "hard up," and the board is endeavoring to make it as easy as possible for them to get water on their land, so crops can be produced.

fever in the most lukewarm sportsman.

Mr. Salisbury promised not only to boost Klamath county to all of his friends, but to select the titles to his pictures as to give this section valuable advertising.

Following the dinner several matters of interest to the local sportsmen were discussed with Mr. Finley. He promised to see that Klamath county secured 100 more pairs of China pheasants, if the association would secure suitable places for them to be liberated, where they would receive protection.

If permission can be secured half a dozen pairs will be placed at each of several ranches near Bly and in Lanell Valley. The balance will be turned loose in the Kamath Basin, between Klamath Falls and Merrill.

Last year 102 pairs were liberated in this section, and they are doing fine.

The matter of securing authority for deputies to issue licenses in different parts of the county was also discussed.

Mr. Finley stated that where the county clerk did not wish to person-

ally take the responsibility of appointing these men, that the state commission had been in the habit of assuming the responsibility on men who were recommended and endorsed by the local sportsmen's association. He advised taking the matter up with the county clerk, and have him write to the commission.

## Jeff Riddle Tells Why He Wrote the History

SON OF WINEMA SAYS THE UNTRUE STORIES OF SOME WRITERS ARE WHAT CAUSED HIM TO PEN THE HISTORY OF THE MODOC WAR FROM THE STANDPOINT OF THE MODOC INDIANS

"As the only schooling I ever had was three weeks at Hawkinsville, Calif., and a like length of time in New York city, and the rest of my ability to read and write was picked up, mostly after my children were born, I never had any intention of becoming a writer. However, after I read Captain Drannon's account of the war, and two or three others that were equally as false, I decided that it was my duty to write of the Modoc War as I knew it, and to give the world a true, though perhaps crudely written, account of the fight, which has been so much misrepresented."

This is the statement made by Jeff C. Riddle, a half-blood Modoc Indian, today, regarding the origin of his book, "Indian History of the Modoc War and Causes Leading Up to It," which is just off the press. The book is written in an unvarnished manner, and in its compilation Riddle has endeavored to give censure and praise

where it belongs, treating red and white impartially.

Riddle is the son of Frank Riddle and Winema, the Indian woman who was the heroine of the conflict in the lava beds. At the time Riddle was 9 years old, and went with his parents, who were interpreters, to all of the conferences, so he has these to support his contentions.

"There was only one conference that I did not attend," said Riddle, "and that was the one at which the peace commission was killed. My parents knew there would be treachery, and so informed the commissioners, but they disregarded the warning."

Although lacking the polish of a

good education, Riddle expresses himself in good, forceful language in his book, and throughout has his subject well in hand. He is being congratulated today by many white friends on his literary success.
