Sir Thomas Lipton and Charles
Nicholson, Shamrock IV. Designer

This photograph of Sir Thomas Lipton and Charles E. Nicholson, designer of Shamrock IV, with which the tea merchant hopes to lift the America's cup, was taken very recently aboard Sir Thomas' yacht Erin. Mr. Nicholson will come to the United States with the yacht, and will sail on her in the races off Sandy Hook. Mr. Nicholson has designed many fast small yachts now sailing in European waters. One of the fast, perhaps the fastest schooner yacht in Europe, the Margarita, was produced by him. He is a partner with his brothers in the firm of Campbell and Nicholson of

Gosport, England, where the Shamrock IV was built. He is a broad enough man, it is said in England, to be willing to accept suggestions concerning the yacht he has designed from others. Nor does he try to take as his own ideas he gets from others. The present tendency of keeping the canvas of modern yachts well in board and lofty brought up the question of rigging to stay satisfactorily the tall mast, and when the so-called Marconi system, used on the Ilaria, Sir Charles C. Allom's successful 15-meter cutter, was suggested to Mr. Nicholson he considered it carefully and adopted it.

Fraternal Insurance
Hangs in the Balance

TOLEDO, Ohio, June 15.—Fraternal history was in the making and the future of fraternal insurance in the United States hung in the balance here today when the Head Camp of the Modern Woodmen of America met in triennial convention.

Not only the million odd "neighbors" of the society watched with the keenest interest the fight that was sure to come up over the question of raising the rates of insurance, but persons holding membership and policies with other fraternal insurance societies realized that the outcome of the contest would determine whether they, too, were eventually to break away from the old low rate plans and join a movement toward the insurance schemes figured out by insurance actuaries.

In the fight today the Head Camp officers stood arrayed against a faction of the delegates coming chiefly from the Mississippi Valley, headed by E. S. Smith of Springfield, Ill. Smith will be the "insurgent" candidate for Head Consul, the chief officer of the Head Camp, opposing A. R. Talbot of Rock Island, Ill., where the Head Camp is located.

It was generally understood that the rate fight would be largely decided by the election of the Head Camp
