Coast Chinese Expect Another Revolution

SAN FRANCISCO, June 16.—All up and down the Pacific coast plans are said to be ripening in the various oriental colonies for another revolution in China. The campaign is said to be under the general direction of Dr. Sun Yat Sen, who was first provisional president of the present republic and mainly responsible for the revolution which overthrew the Manchus. Sun is in exile in Japan and President Yuan Shi-kai is reported to have offered \$1,000,000 for his head.

In the United States the agitation is being done by Y. P. Hsieh, for whom, dead or alive, Yuan is understood to have offered \$100,000.

Hsieh has toured the country and professes to have found financial backing. He is authority for the statement that the revolt is already simmering in central China and may be expected to break out in full violence within the next few months.

The agitators charge Yuan with having undone all the work of the revolution and established a despotism of his own under the name of a republic.

Some of them give him credit for being a sincere believer in a despotic form of government for China, but they say they do not propose to submit to it merely because he is sincere in thinking it desirable.

Cleveland and put the movement under full headway. In addition, Miss Douglas, aided by other prominent social workers, will seek to have every city adopt some plan to aid the working girl.

The movement will embrace clubs and other places to attract girls of the department stores and factories who now frequent public dance halls, where they are always confronted with attendant dangers.

Mrs. Mary Minora, less than 15 years old, testified before the United States Commission of Industrial Relations sitting in New York that she lived with her father, mother, brother and husband. She has a 6-months-old child. Mrs. Minora told the committee that she earned 60 cents by working thirteen hours a day, finishing trousers, and her mother earned 70 to 80 cents. As some of the male members have been out of employment for nine months, these earnings maintained the household.

Invitation to Submit Proposals
Pursuant to an ordinance duly passed and adopted by the Common Council of the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, on the 8th day of June, 1914, and duly approved by the mayor thereof, notice is hereby given that proposals will be received by the Police Judge of the said city, at his office, corner of Main and Second streets, up to and including the 6th day of July, 1914, at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m., for the improvement of Eleventh street, including all intersections, from Main street to Upham street, Worden avenue from Upham street to Donald street, and Donald street from Worden avenue to Sargent street, by grading to the established grade to a width of twenty-four feet, and hard surfacing said roadway twenty-four feet wide with a 4-inch macadam base and 2-inch asphalt top with concrete curbs and gutters and necessary drainage. All of said improvement to be made and the materials to be used to be done and furnished in accordance with the plans and specifications adopted by the Common Council, and now on file in the office of the Police Judge of said city, reference thereto is hereby made for further details regarding construction, materials and quantities. Said improvement to be done under contract. Proposals will be open-

ed and considered on the 6th day of July, 1914.

Bidders will be required to submit their proposals upon blanks prepared by the city engineer, and no proposal will be considered unless so submitted.

Said improvement to be completed within — months from date of execution of contract.

The successful bidder will be required to give bond in a sum to be fixed by the council for the faithful completion of such improvement in accordance with the contract, plans and specifications.

Each proposal to be accompanied by a certified check, certified by a responsible bank, for 5 per cent of the amount of the proposal, as a guarantee that the successful bidder will enter into contract with the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, within ten days after the award, said amount to be forfeited to the city in case of failure of the successful bidder to enter into contract.

The city reserves the right to reject any and all proposals, and to make such improvement itself.
