I. D. O'Donnell Looking Over Klamath Project

I. D. O'Donnell, a member of the reclamation commission, came in last night to spend a few days making an inspection of the Klamath project and its problems. He is looking over all the projects in the West.

Mr. O'Donnell is in charge of the operation and maintenance features of the commission's work, and while here he will discuss irrigation matters with farmers. E. G. Hopson, the supervising engineer for the Pacific division, is also here, and he and Mr. O'Donnell are being taken around the project by Project Manager Camp today.

The party visited Midland, Merrill and Malin and vicinity today, and Mr. O'Donnell interviewed a number of the farmers. This afternoon at Malin he gave a highly instructive talk to the farmers.

This evening he will deliver a similar talk to the water users at Merrill. After that he will return to Klamath Falls. Tomorrow O'Donnell, Hopson and Camp will visit the Second Unit of the project. At 1:30 O'Donnell will address the farmers at Poe Valley. Tomorrow evening at 7:30 he will address the Henley district farmers.

FORD OFFICIAL CAR IN BOSTON

MAYOR CURLEY DECIDES THAT FORD RUNABOUTS WILL BE PURCHASED HEREINAFTER FOR CITY EMPLOYEES

BOSTON, June 17.—Ford runabouts will be purchased for all employees of the city of Boston who are provided with cars in the future, according to a pronouncement just issued by Mayor Curley.

"I have decided to make the Ford runabout the official car under my administration," the mayor declared. "It doesn't cost so much to buy, and can be operated twenty miles on a gallon of gasoline. By discarding the heavy cars now in use and putting in an equipment of Fords, the city will save several thousands of dollars without impairing in any way its automobile service."

Church Urges Holiday
