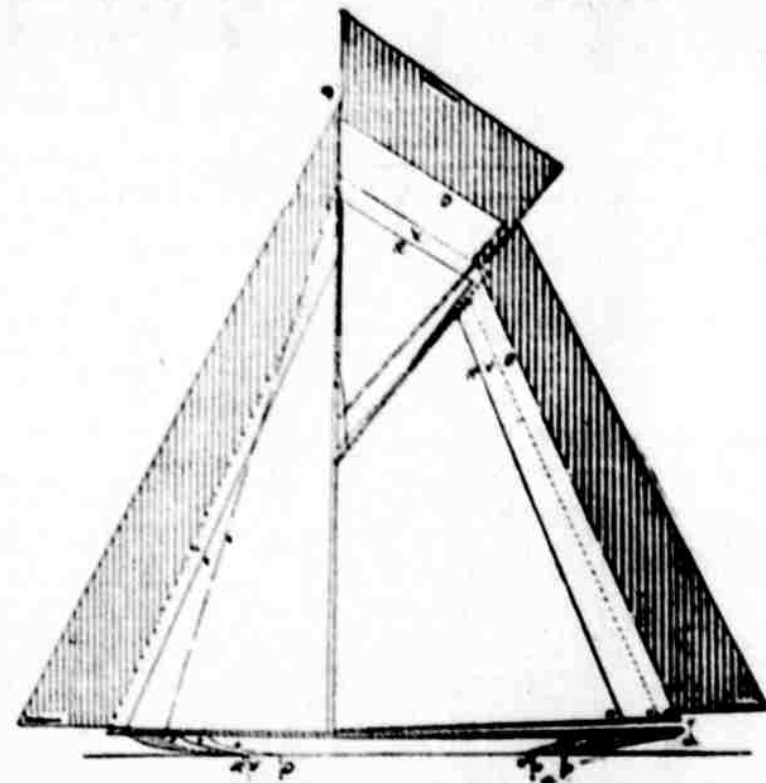

WHITE BREAD
Sponge Method

One cake Fleischmann's yeast, 1 1/2 quarts lukewarm water, 2
tablespoonfuls lard or butter, 1 tablespoon salt, 4 1/2 quarts sifted

sugar in one quart of the lukewarm water, and add to it 1 1/2 quarts
