

Bureau of Industries Has No Official Status

PORTLAND, June 25.—Some confusion has been caused by the activities of the state bureau of industries and statistics, many persons believing it to be an official body at Salem. The only strictly state statistical bureau in recent years was created by the legislature of 1913 to prepare data for the booklet showing Oregon's resources, industries, products and possibilities distributed through the Portland commercial club and other community organizations.

The official life of this bureau was terminated at the close of its work. O. P. Hoff is commissioner of labor statistics and inspector of factories and workshops, and the statistics kept by the bureau are necessarily confined to certain lines relating to employment of labor in factories and shops.

The organization which has been operating since its incorporation, January 26, 1914, as the State Bureau of Industries and Statistics, is incorporated by E. Hofer, president, Fred R. Hynon, secretary, and Elmer J. Brown, treasurer. The moving spirit in the organization is Colonel Hofer of Salem, editor of the Pacific Coast Manufacturer.

Hynon is secretary of the Salem

Commercial Club, and Brown, the treasurer, is said to be connected with the Oregon Agricultural College. Who the other members are, if there are any, is not generally known.

This "bureau" is said to be really an adjunct to the Pacific Coast Manufacturer, and its purpose to have articles published from its country newspapers, with the view to influencing legislation on the subject of manufactures and industries. The bureau has no capital and no stockholders.

However, the articles of incorporation provide that the bureau shall be composed of citizens of Oregon, voluntarily associating themselves together for the purpose of promoting the establishment, support and maintenance of manufacturing enterprises in all parts of the state, and offices and members of committees on promotion of manufactures and industries shall be considered honorary members of the bureau if they are certified by commercial organizations to which they belong.

It is said to be the intention to change the name of this bureau so that it will not lead to the erroneous belief that it is a part of the state government.

HOW MORAN EXPECTS TO DO IT

With this hook Moran started Al Palmer, who by some persons was looked upon as a coming champion. He battered the great bulk of the Iowa farmer till he had him going, and then slipped in a straight right hand which was the finisher. Moran holds his left arm extended and snaps the hook to the head with a sharp movement. The blow does not travel far, but it carries power. You may see from the second picture that he

gets his power from his shoulder muscles. Many pugilists who use the left hook put no more power in it than is contained in the muscles of the arm. But Moran is able not only to throw his weight into the blow, but the muscles of his shoulder and chest—the minor pectoralis—which is the fan-shaped muscles spreading from the arm over the left side of the breast. When he lands the blow he has concentrated all the force in his body—

his weight, the muscles of his shoulder and chest, and those of his arm. If he can land that punch on Jack Johnson's jaw he may become the champion of the world. The betting is very strong against his doing it. Moran, however, has more than a left hook. In fact, his right is heavier than his left. He has a perfectly straight right which does not travel very far, but it carries knockout strength.

PARIS, June 25.—Jack Johnson and Frank Moran, black and white, meet here Saturday night at the Vendome d'Hiver. If the white man wins the lucky punch will be worth a fortune to him. If his punch lacks the necessary ginger, good night, Mr. Moran!

That is the way the betting man sizes up the fight. For Moran it means everything. Either he will open his eyes on Sunday morning a famous fighter, with a golden sunrise and a golden day in front of him, or he will regain consciousness only to realize that his sun has set, and that he is not even a has-been; that he has had his chance and not made good; that he is an almost-was, yet a never-was.

For Jack Johnson the fight doesn't mean so much. If he defeats Moran he will do no more than is expected of him here. He will not gain a particle in popularity despite the fact that his need of public adoration is now a negligible quantity.

Should he take the count, he will lose nothing, since he has nothing to lose. Win, lose or draw, he gets only

his \$30,000, plus \$5,000 training expenses, which he has now drawn.

Lose or win, he will be a professional automobile driver, having already signed a contract with the makers of a Belgium car and French tire makers.

In his own words, he has "got his." A black satellite of Johnson's told the United Press correspondent: "Jack don't care how the fight comes out; he's got his already, and the way his future business is mapped out, it isn't going to hurt him much, win or lose."

There is only one hitch to this statement. Johnson hates the white man, and unless circumstances have altered since the wise ones had a look-in, he will try to put Moran to sleep.

Invitation to Submit Proposals

Pursuant to an ordinance duly passed and adopted by the Common Council of the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, on the 8th day of June, 1914, and duly approved by the mayor thereof, notice is hereby given that proposals will be received by the Police Judge of the said city, at his office, corner of Main and Second streets, up to and including the 6th day of July, 1914, at the hour of 3 o'clock p. m., for the improvement of Eleventh street, including all intersections, from Main street to Upham street, Worden avenue from Upham street to Donald street, and Donald street from Worden avenue to Sargent street, by grading to the established grade to a width of twenty-four feet, and hard surfacing said roadway twenty-four feet wide with a 4-inch macadam base and 2-inch asphalt macadam top with concrete curbs and gutters and necessary drainage. All gutters and necessary drainage. All of said improvement to be made and the materials to be used to be done and furnished in accordance with the plans and specifications adopted by the Common Council, and now on file in the office of the Police Judge of said city, reference thereto is hereby made for further details regarding construction, materials and quantities.

Bidders will be required to submit their proposals upon blanks prepared by the city engineer, and no proposal will be considered unless so submitted.

Said improvement to be completed within — months from date of execution of contract.

The successful bidder will be required to give bond in a sum to be fixed by the council for the faithful completion of such improvement in accordance with the contract, plans and specifications.

Each proposal to be accompanied by a certified check, certified by a responsible bank, for 5 per cent of the amount of the proposal, as a guarantee that the successful bidder will enter into contract with the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, within ten days after the award, said amount to be forfeited to the city in case of failure of the successful bidder to enter into contract.
