National Credit Men Talk
of Regulating the Trusts

President of the University of Wisconsin Tells Difference
Between Big Volume of Business and a Monopoly

ROCHESTER, N. Y., June 26.—
Retention of competition, prohibition
of monopoly, permission for co-opera-
tion of the latter, instead of regulated
competition or regulated monopoly,
was suggested today as the solution of
the trust problem of the country by
President Charles R. Van Hise of the
University of Wisconsin, in an ad-
dress at the annual meeting of the
National Association of Credit Men.

"There may be great magnitude of
business, and not monopoly," declared
President Van Hise. "Indeed, it is
believed that by far the greater num-
ber of the large organizations fall
short of monopoly. Only if we as-
sume that if all the great combina-
tions of industry are monopolies, does
the conclusion follow that they should
be destroyed? Not only do I hold
that not all large business is monop-
olistic; but that concentration up to a
certain point is to give efficiency.

"If we retain freedom of competi-
tion, permit concentration sufficient
to give efficiency, allow reasonable
co-operation, and prevent monopoly, this
will require regulation just as it has
been necessary to regulate the rail-
roads. This done, the Sherman law
will be forgotten. Has there been
any prosecutions of the railroads for
violation of the Sherman law because
of collusion in fixing rates? And yet
everyone of us here knows that they
are just as flagrant violators of the
Sherman act as any other class of
corporations in the United States. Are
the freight rates the same for differ-
ent roads between any two points?
Are the passenger rates between New
York and St. Louis identical on all
roads? Can you do better in price by
traveling over the Pennsylvania than
over any other road? The rate is the
same providing the speed is the same.

"For a number of years it has ap-
peared to me that the interstate com-
merce commission and the numerous
state commissions having control of
public utilities and the pure food com-
mission clearly point the way for the
next step in the solution of our in-
dustrial problems.

"The most fundamental difference
between the United States Steel cor-
poration, the Standard Oil company,
and other very large businesses and
the public utilities, is that one class
has been declared to be vested with a
public interest and the other has not.

merce and state trade commissions
for state commerce, each to have con-
trol over business which is vested
with a public interest or in which the
market is controlled, precisely as the
public utilities commission have con-
trol over the public utilities. It is to
be noted that this proposal does not
imply that the administrator commis-
sions shall have control of all busi-
ness, but only business which, because
of magnitude, or because of co-opera-
tion, becomes vested with public in-
terest. The initiative in control of
business will remain with the busi-
ness organizations precisely the same
as at present; but whenever an or-
ganization performs an act which, in
the opinion of the appropriate com-
mission under the powers granted, is
contrary to the public interest, that
body may intervene. My proposal is
that the restraint of trade, either by
combination or contract, and co-opera-
tion in limitation of output, divi-
sion of territory, or fixing of prices,
be prohibited so far as they are in-
timid to the welfare of the public. Not
only so, but it may be wise to make a
presumption that actions of corpora-
tions along the above line are inimical
to the welfare of the public until ap-
proved by the commission.
