

Veal Demand Gets Bigger Each Year

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 26.—The demand for veal has increased rapidly, and not only are the surplus dairy calves slaughtered, but thousands of beef calves as well, until a calf will now sell for from \$18 to \$12 when only two to three months old.

This quotation from the latest Farmer's Bulletin by the United States department of agriculture means that unless the farmer has unlimited cheap feeds, it is usually more profitable to market the dairy or dual-

purpose calves than to attempt to raise them, even though some of them might make good steers.

While the number of cattle has decreased, the demand for meat has naturally grown until not only have the exports nearly ceased, but the packers, that they may provide cheap meat, are now buying many cattle that were formerly fed. The farmers who formerly bought nearly finished cattle as feeders have been compelled to pay higher prices for such cattle or to take thinner animals.

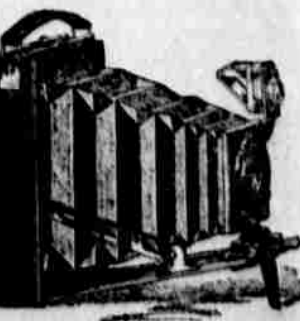

Sponge Method
