to below the knees, where it also
flares out in a ruching-edged flounce
to the ankles. The elbow sleeves are
tucked down half way to fluff out
loosely over the elbow, with the inevi-
table ruching.

Truly an ideal negligee for home
use these days, the unbuttoned waist
exclaims, but it's nay, nay, on the home
stuff. This little pink and pretty con-
fection is intended for wear out
among the gaping multitude. It's
certainly going to be a pretty tough
proposition for a poor girl these days

OUR WEEKLY SERMON

"The Secret of His Presence"

Ps. 91:1: He that dwelleth in the
secret place of the most high shall
abide under the shadow of the Al-
mighty.

This is one of the most beautiful
expressions in the Bible. First, be-
cause it is very po-
etic and, second, be-
cause it holds up
one of the greatest
privileges that can
come to the child-
ren of God. It is
very true that all
Christians do not
occupy the same po-
sition, in this world.
All are saved by
Christ's blood, but
there is much more
to the Christian life
than being saved.

Many people travel,
but so few "see things." The
blessings pronounced in our text are
not for all the children of God, but
only for those who live in close fel-
lowship with Him. There are honors
and glory sufficient for all, but they
justly can belong to only those who
live in the shadow of the Almighty. It
is a sweet thought to know that in
this world there is a secret place
where we may "abide." One has
written:

I love in solitude to shed
The penitential tear;
And all his promises to plead
When none but God can hear.

The word shadow is very interest-
ing. There never was a shadow with-
out light, hence the secret place must
be brightness. In Psalms 119 the
writer seems, in a general way, to be
speaking of God's presence. One has
said: "He has been beating out the
golden ore of thought, through suc-
cessive paragraphs of marvelous pow-
er and beauty until he seems to feel
the nearness of God and cries out,
"Thou art near, O God." "

Moses is supposed to be the author
of this Psalm, and this "secret place"

certainly has reference to the holy
place in the tabernacle. Peter assures
us that in the Christian dispensation
we have become a "holy priesthood,"
so we can enter in on that ground.
The Hebrew meaning of "abide" is
"shall pass the night." Certain ex-
periences have seemed to us Heaven
begun, but later we proved them to be
but shadows sweeping the hillside.
There is a rest that comes the moment
we accept the Redeemer's pardon and
past sin is blotted out. But Christ's
"come unto me" is followed by "take
my yoke upon you." The first rest
comes when we are close enough to
"take his yoke," i. e., in "the secret
of his presence." "He shall cover thee
with his feathers,"—as a mother bird
shelters her young.

There is satisfaction and peace in
the secret of his presence. Christ said
"In the world ye shall have tribula-
tion, but in me ye shall have peace."
It is impossible to have two thoughts
in the same mind at the same time,
but there is heart as well as the mind,
and while the mind is busy the heart
may rejoice in the fullness of God.

Then there is purity in His pres-
ence. If our surroundings were only
better in this world our lives would
be purer. O, the beauty of the "secret
place"! In the holy place the curtains
were of fine linen, so fine angels' fin-
gers must have wrought them, there
were blue and purple colors, and the
golden candlestick: one look will
surely make us pure, and the "pure
in heart shall see God."

There is power in his presence.
This power comes with the gift of the
Holy Spirit. There is no effective
service that is not the outcome of
communion with God. So let us live
near Him that we may lift men to a
higher plane and lighten the world's
burden.
