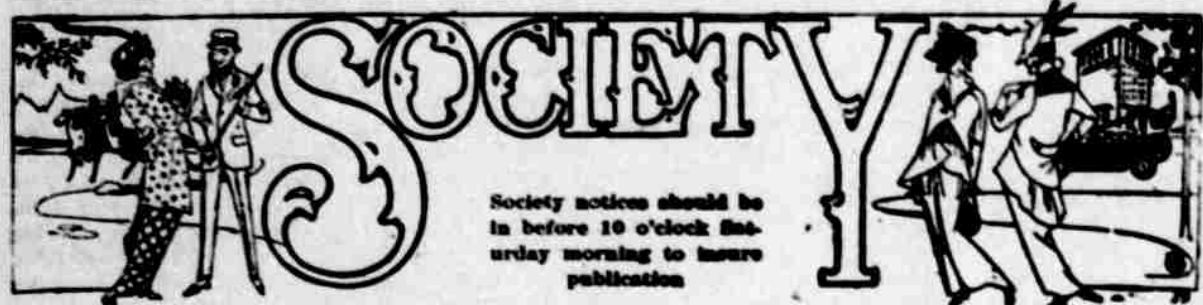

Doctor Forbids T. R. to Make Coast Trip

EX-PRESIDENT'S HEALTH IS IN BAD SHAPE, ACCORDING TO DOCTOR, WHO ADVISES HIM TO TAKE A REST OF AT LEAST FOUR MONTHS' DURATION

OYSTER BAY, June 27.—Ex-President Theodore Roosevelt today cancelled his proposed trip to California, on account of the condition of his health. Dr. Lambert, his physician, ordered this change in plans, and he states that the Colonel is sicker than he looks.

The doctor has ordered his patient to take a four-months' rest. He says Roosevelt's system is alive with malarial fever, and that he has also developed an enlarged spleen.

Dr. Lambert tried vainly to dissuade Roosevelt from speaking at Pittsburgh Tuesday.

"Dr. Lambert takes rather a melancholy view of it," said Roosevelt.



"Personally, I don't think I'm so terribly bad. He wants me to take a four-months' rest, but that's out of the question."
