Suffrage Workers Call
on President Wilson

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 30.—
Demanding votes for women, several
hundred club women from every part
of the country swooped on the White
House today. It was the second femi-
nine invasion of this kind within a
short time.
Their leaders admitted that they had
picked their time, because tomorrow
the rules committee meets. They
hoped this body would pass a suffrage
rule, along with the scheduled busi-
ness of considering the prohibition
rule.
They urged President Wilson to see
that the committee took such action.
Mrs. Harvey W. Wiley, wife of the
famous pure food expert, headed the
delegation.
She appeared in the role of head of
the District of Columbia Branch of
the Federation of Women's Clubs,
which federation recently endorsed
the votes for women cause.
Carrying their yellow banners, and
wearing broad ribbons on their shirt-
waists, the women marched to the
executive offices.

The French Live on What
Americans Throw Away

PARIS, June 30.—"What Ameri-
cans throw away the French live
on," declared Simon W. Strauss of
Chicago, President of the American
Society for Thrift, in an interview
with the United Press. Mr. Strauss is
investigating conditions in Europe
with the approval of the United States
government.

"The French," the investigator con-
tinued, "are the most economical peo-
ple on the face of the earth, and I
wish every American could come over
and take a lesson from them. The
Swiss are next, and after them, the
Germans.

"But I want to say this: After see-
ing these people I am more than im-
pressed with the wastefulness of the
American individual, and that unless
he calls a halt the nation is in for a
serious time. Dark days will be the
result. More than any other factor
this wastefulness with us is responsi-
ble for the high cost of living. The
French, Swiss and Germans throw
away nothing; everything is of some
use. We throw away all save the
best. We are spendthrifts in money,
in energy, health, and everything.

"I see but one remedy: We must
commence at the bottom and work
our way up. Reform must start
among the people and work higher.
We cannot have an economical na-
tion, or states, counties, cities, towns
or communities until we have economi-
cal individuals, and my doctrine is
that there lies the key to the situa-
tion. Educate the individual. If we
can manage to have economical, thrif-
ty units, the community, town, city,
county, state and nation will be eco-
nomical and thrifty.

"Next year at the Panama Pacific
exposition, we plan to hold an interna-
tional thrift congress. I hope to see
France, Germany, England and Swit-
zerland and other countries repre-
sented, for since I have been over
here I have discovered that the cost
of living is increasing in Europe, a
fact coinciding with a growing in-
flation, especially in the capitals, to
spend money lavishly.
"Especially is this spendthrift habit
conspicuous in Berlin.

"We will urge the education of
the individual in thrift. This educa-
tion, of course, must start early, with
the child in school.

"We will encourage school gardens.
Experiments have shown that young
children can earn in this play-work
some \$20 a year. If every school
child earned even \$10 a year, or \$5
a year, there would be a national
economy of millions.

"We will encourage savings banks
in schools. Deposits of nickels and
dimes given to the children by par-
ents we would encourage, but rather
would we have the children earn the
money doing some sort of work or
performing some honorable act.

Pittsburg has tried this plan to
some extent, and a Michigan school
has experimented a little along this
line with the most excellent results.
School buildings are idle for a great

part of the year, this property repre-
sents millions of dollars invested.
Here is a big loss.
"We will try and find a way in
which the schools may be utilized for
the good of the communities of which
they are centers. Here will be a big
economy. We will encourage employ-
ers to give more thought to their em-
ployees. I know of one concern which
demands that each employe save \$1 of
each \$10 earned. The money is placed
in a bank and draws interest. The
only excuse accepted for not saving is
actual need for the money, as during
illness of the employe or family.

"The manner of floating bonds over
here should be copied by us. I con-
sider it one of the greatest possible
means of encouraging thrift. When
the government wishes to borrow
money, 100 franc (\$20) bonds are
scattered all over the country and
offered for sale by the banks.

"A bond may be had on payment of
a first 20 franc (\$4), for instance,
and the balance on installments as
the government needs the money.
What is the result?

"Why, there is scarcely a rag-pick-
er in France who hasn't a few govern-
ment bonds laid away drawing inter-
est. Everybody has bonds here,
whereas with us, when we issue bonds
they are of such denominations that
only the rich man can touch them.
