How to Ship Eggs by Mail to Market

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Ore., Aug. 10.—Eggs properly packed in suitable containers can be shipped in quantities of ten dozen for a distance of fifty to 150 miles and the containers returned at a total cost of slightly more than three cents per dozen.

The cost of sending twenty pounds a distance of fifty to 150 miles by parcel post is 24 cents. The rate for returning the four-pound container is 8 cents. Thus the entire cost of the shipment of ten dozen eggs not counting cost of container is 32 cents, which is slightly more than 3 cents per dozen.

The problem of bringing producer and consumer together and arranging terms of delivery and payment is being worked out by Professor Dryden, of the Agricultural College, who has already secured the names of some Willamette Valley farmers, between whom trade relations will be established as rapidly as possible.
