Missouri Is Busy On Her Highways Today

JEFFERSON, Mo., Aug. 14.—Armed with pick and shovel, Governor Major, for the second time, today led the men of Missouri in the betterment of the state's highways.

Today and tomorrow are Good Roads Days by executive proclamation. Major inaugurated a Good Road plan last year, and 250,000 men in two days donated work and ma-

terial estimated to be worth \$1,500,000.

Greater results are expected this year.

The results obtained last year stood out so favorably and the plan proved so popular that many other states took up the idea while more are preparing to follow the move of Missouri this year. August dates were selected because the season is most favorable for road improvements and because the farmers have more spare time at this particular season.

The governor believes that a large percent of the men who observe the proclamation will work not only on

the two days designated, but five days.

Thousands of Missouri chickens today were sacrificed to the cause. The good wives, knowing well the appetites of road workers, selected shady spots near where the various gangs were at work and served real feeds for the volunteers, which turned the noon hour into a picnic.
