

WELLS-FARGO IS QUITTING COAST

FOUR OFFICES IN MENDOCINO COUNTY CLOSED LAST WEEK BY EXPRESS COMPANY—ALL WERE ON STAGE ROUTES

The Wells Fargo offices at Mendocino, Point Arena, Albion and Greenwood in Mendocino county, Calif., were closed by the express company last week, according to advices received from there.

All of these offices were on stage routes, and it is reported that owing to the competition of the parcel post the company will discontinue all of its offices on the stage lines there.

HUNTING SEASON ORDERED STOPPED

DISTRICT FIRE WARDEN CHITWOOD RECEIVES ADVICES FROM SALEM OF THE CLOSING OF THE SEASON

District Fire Warden C. C. Chitwood this afternoon received a telegram from State Forester Elliott, notifying him that the governor has issued a proclamation, closing the deer season until September 1st. This is on account of the many fires started throughout the state, presumably by hunters.

The fire warden was ordered to send his deputies to advise all hunting parties in the hills of the postponement, and to give notice to those planning on going deer hunting.

ACROBATIC MOOD FATAL TO HORSE

ANIMAL ERRANDS TO WALK OVER RAILROAD BRIDGE—FALLS TO STREET BELOW AND NECK IS BROKEN

It is also announced that England, France and Russia have formally accepted the offer of the American Red Cross society to furnish nurses, surgical equipment and hospital supplies.

This photograph shows the German soldiers at rest just as 100,000 of them rested during the two hour truce granted by King Albert of Belgium during the siege of Liege. They

were worn out after four days of fighting in which some 30,000 of them were killed. While the trials

of the defending Belgians have been great, they have not equalled the hardships of the German troops, who, attacking in a foreign and hostile

country, have had to fight every hour during five days. Whatever sleep any of them won was at the cost of lessened effort in the assault against the stubborn fortifications.

LIVESTOCK SHOW PLANS UNDER WAY

COPIES OF THE PRELIMINARY CLASSIFICATIONS ARE BEING MAILED OUT—\$15,000 IN PRIZE AWARDS

NORTH PORTLAND, Aug. 18.—Officials of the fourth annual Pacific International Livestock Exposition are now mailing out the preliminary classification for the show to be held at the Union Stock Yards in December. "The show will be bigger than ever this year."

This exposition is purely educational along livestock lines, there being no Wild West or other amusement features, and is unique in that it pays over \$15,000 in cash premiums and makes no charge for entry fee, stall room or admission. Like the International of Chicago, the Pacific International of Portland is recognized as the court of last resort on the Pacific Coast.

Early reports indicate 50 per cent larger entries than last year, and commercial organizations all over the country will be asked to co-operate with the railroads in forming special parties to attend Portland during show week.

Bankers, as well as breeders and commercial clubs, are taking a keen

interest in this exposition, and are lending it their very active support. The country at large is very thoroughly awake to the importance of livestock production, and no other agency has a larger influence than our exposition.

OREGON FARM DAY OVER NINE HOURS

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE FIGURES FARMHANDS HERE WORKS 9 HOURS, 44 MINUTES, AND RECEIVES \$81 AND BOARD

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 18.—The farm laborers of Oregon work on an average of nine hours and forty four minutes per day, according to a report which has just been issued by the United States department of agriculture.

More than 27,000 laborers are employed on the farms of Oregon, and the average monthly compensation is \$31 with board, and \$44.50 if the laborer boards himself.

These figures relate to the year 1912. The average wage for farm labor in continental United States is \$13.85 per month with board, and \$19.97 without board.
