JURY FINDS NO CRIME IN CASE

CORONER'S JURY HEARS THE TESTIMONY OF SEVERAL WITNESSES REGARDING DEATH OF A. P. HUTCHINS

"We, the jury empanelled and sworn to examine into the cause of the death of Anderson P. Hutchins, after listening to the sworn testimony of various witnesses, find:

"That the name of deceased was Anderson P. Hutchins; that he came to his death in the city of Klamath Falls, Klamath county, Oregon, on the 17th day of August, 1914; that death was caused by a falling elevator in the building of the Farmers Implement and Supply House, in the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, on which elevator deceased was operating and riding, and that no crime has been committed.

"Signed: C. H. Withrow (foreman), J. W. Lindsay, W. E. Seehorn, Fred Noel, W. C. Townsend.

"Attest: Earl Whitlock, county coroner."

The foregoing was agreed upon last night, after the jury had examined several witnesses regarding the fatal accident. According to J. S. Peck, who examined the elevator after the accident, both keys were missing from between the shaft and the drum. One key was found on the basement floor, and Peck's theory is that when he pulled the rope to send the elevator down, he inadvertently pulled out the key, making the drum independent of the shaft, and causing the cage to drop.

POPE PIUS BREATHE HIS LAST

successor to Leo XIII. his people hailed him as the next pope. He remonstrated with them, saying that such an event was beyond the range of possibility.

When the ballot began to turn strong his way he became his own most strenuous opponent. He took the floor to entreat the Sacred College to desist from the idea of electing him, and strove to show wherein he lacked the requisites necessary to equip him to occupy the papal throne. But his words had a contrary effect.

In the dignity, the humility and the great breadth of learning disclosed in these discourses, the patriarch stood before his colleagues as the one man to be placed at the head of the church. He was chosen on the sixth ballot.

In his first public audience Pope Pius X. received a band of pilgrims from the United States led by Cardinal Gibbons. He retained his frugal manner of living, and his habit as a tremendous worker.

In the government of the church he displayed the broad grasp of affairs, thorough understanding and sure judgment that marked his administration of the lesser though important duties that had been intrusted to him by the church. He was considerate and sympathetic, while strictly upholding the dignity of his high position, and he earned the loyalty and devotion and admiration of all in the church, and the respect of the world.

Probably his most important declarations were in two bulls, one of which protested against the growing modernism in religious and church work, the other requiring all engagements to be listed with the parish priest.

Pre-eminent among Pope Pius' characteristics were his democracy, his utter defiance of convention, and his disregard of precedent. Of peasant parentage, he was peculiarly the pope of the poor. Peasants were as welcome to the Vatican as princes, and he gave them his blessing alike, without favor.

His charities were proverbial. Perhaps his most drastic defiance of pre-

cedence was the bringing of women to his table in the persons of his sisters. Since the foundation of the Catholic church there were only two instances of women having eaten in the pope's apartments.

Pope Pius X. frequently had his sisters together with members of his official family at his own table.

Such was the life of this great man, who was a barefooted peasant boy, and who became the spiritual ruler of more than 200,000,000 people.
