Hence the evolution of the frock coat which is simply a garment whose waist continues in flaring lines to the calf in simulation of a veritable long coat over a skirt.

With the exception of the long, unbroken line from shoulder to finish, the effect is practically the same as that of the long Russian tunic. These coat dresses are particularly smart for early fall wear of blue serge or in satin, both materials lavishly braided in wide and narrow widths of black silk soutache braid used in combination.

Women's clothes are certainly due for a large share of upbraiding this autumn, but so long as they are to be down braided and braided all around as well this will no doubt take the curse off.

Since bullets at the front are all the rage in France, it seems only apropos that bullet buttons should be all the rage at the front of the feminine frocks on this side of the water. These buttons are equally chic in metal or satin and cloth covered.

The flaring collars of white organdie and batiste so omnipresent on all and every sort of frock are now replete with pleats and even a new square flat collar of sheer lace and organdie that falls down the back like a sailor collar comes pleted in divers tiny folds.

With practically all the new models for fall and winter showing the straight lines of the semi-fitted basque the coat frock and the chemise gown. It promises to be a hard winter indeed for any but the sveltest of the sveltest. A fat or even a plump woman has but the choice of two evils, either to don one of the loose

lined styles which gives her immediately all the dainty versatility of a vixen or a hogshead, or to stick to her last year's mod's and be dubbed passepasse, unless some gallant designer leaps into the breach and turns out a life and figure saving model for the portly.

A freak fashion that savors strongly of the decorative instinct of a Hot-tent chief is the use of a fringe of shiny long black monkey fur around the bottom of a deep girde on an evening frock and a light fringe outlining the edge of a short coat to a white serge or gabardine suit.

Fortunately this out ward use of monkey fur is not apt to be aped by anyone possessing a shroud of either athletic or ordinary good taste.

The combination of the sleek black fur with the white, however, shows the penchant for black and white to be absolutely undiminished and vying with the black satin basque and coat frocks, cuffed and collared in organdie and the chemise, basque and coatdresses of all white taffeta are now offered similar silken models made up in tiny black and white check silk.

Though this intermittent craze for checks is temporarily checked from time to time, it never fails to break out anew at least once a season. Besides the black and white checked silk frocks, heavy capes of shepherds plaid are also frequently glimpsed worn half slipping off of smart shoulders.

There is just one word of grace to say about the passing of the Russian tunic.

A respite may be granted its too abrupt passing, provided it is willing to get beneath the yoke. In other words, if you allow your tunic to drop from a fitted yoke about the hips instead of its former falling full or pleated from the waist line you may still wear it with an up-to-date conscience.

Germans' Great Army Described by Journal

Germany's immense military organization is graphically described in a recent issue of the Illustrated, Zettung, Leipzig, which shows that the foundation of the system is just 100 years old, for 100 years ago Prussia made it a legal requirement that every able-bodied citizen should subscribe to military training.

Today under the German empire the peace footing is 22,000 commissioned officers, 109,500 non-commissioned officers and \$17,500 men; the war strength is about 4,500,000 soldiers.

For purposes of defense and mobilization Germany is divided into ten fortress districts, each with its group of fortified cities. Fortresses and military camps of the first class are located at Koenigsberg, Danzig, Osn, Neisse, Spandau, Magdeburg, Kumburg, Mainz, Ulm, Hanstadt, Metz, Cologne, Kiel, Strassburg and Ingolstadt.

Coast defenses are located at Danzig, P. Illau, Memel, Cuxhafen, Geestmunde, Wilhelmshafen and Swinemunde.

The towns of Gogau, Torgau, Diedenhofen, Bitch, Saarbrun and Gernsbach are designed for railroad defense and obstruction.

The entire railroad and telegraph system of Germany has been planned so as to put these places at the highest strategic advantage.

The German army is now using the Mauser rifle, model 1898, while the cavalry carries a Mauser carbine. All classes of mounted troops carry lances. Krupp guns firing a fifteen-pound shell are used by the field and horse artillery. Howitzers firing thirty and forty pound projectiles are also used.

Every German, physically able, must serve his time in the army. After a youth reaches the age of 17 he cannot leave the country without the consent of the military authorities. At 20 he is assigned to service in the infantry, artillery or cavalry. Farmer lads are preferably assigned to the cavalry, due to their greater experience with horsemanship. As a recruit the cavalryman and the sailor must serve three years, the infantry and the artilleryman two years.

At the completion of his active service the soldier enters the reserve for five years, but is required to serve only eight weeks of each two years. Leaving the reserve he enters the landwehr, serving occasionally until his forty-fifth year.

The landsturm comprises all the remaining citizens capable of bearing arms, whether physically perfect or not.

After having completed his continuous service the citizen is always on call, and must have his leave of absence renewed every two years.

The German navy is manned from the maritime population, although of recent years the number of volunteers is said to be increasingly large.

The German naval strength is about 73,000 men, with a reserve of 110,000. Germany has 21 dreadnaughts, 20 battleships, 9 armored cruisers, 38 protected cruisers, 152 destroyers, 47 torpedo boats and 37 submarines.

The heavily fortified island of Heligoland in the North Sea guards the mouth of the Elbe and the principal seaports of Hamburg and Bremen. Germany maintains a garrison of about 2,700 men in China and a few soldiers in German East Africa.
