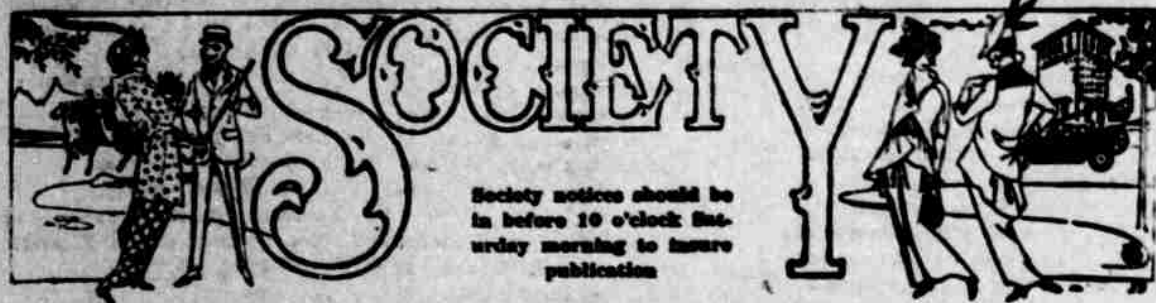

The lecture Wednesday evening by Mrs. Lillian Mitchner, president of the Kansas W. C. T. U., was clear and convincing, and was well received by a large and appreciative audience. The statistics she gave in regard to the difference in administration in Missouri and Kansas were eye-openers, and those who heard her must surely have been convinced as to the advantages of the enforced prohibition law in a state. The lecture was not entirely devoted to statistics, but was punctuated by well put illustrations. The lecture was prefaced by two songs by Messrs. Kinross, Mot-schenbacher and Mohaffey, a solo by Lawrence Mohaffey and a song by seven girls. The audience room was tastefully decorated, the color scheme being white and yellow. White, the W. C. T. U. of Klamath Falls, presented Mrs. Mitchner with a beautiful bouquet of hand-made sunflowers. The audience then adjourned to the basement for refreshments, where they were treated to an abundance of ice cream and cake. The company at Mrs. Mitchner's table were Mrs. B. S. Grigsby, county president of Klamath County W. C. T. U.; Mrs. Frances Boyd, local president of Klamath Falls Union, and Rev. and Mrs. Childs of Ashland, who have been in the county for some time working in the interest of the dry state. The table was decorated with sunflowers. At the table at the left of Mrs. Mitchner were seated Hon. R. A. Booth, candidate for United States senator; Captain O. C. Applegate, Judge H. L. Benson, R. A. Emmitt and O. A. Stearns. The lecture and reception was a success, owing to the untiring labors of the local W. C. T. U., under the leadership of their president, Mrs. Boyd. The W. C. T. U. of Klamath Falls is composed of a body of women who have the interests of other mothers and their children at heart, and are working for the uplift of mankind. Their motto is: "For God and Home and Every Land."
