

Date of Opening of the Game Season in Doubt

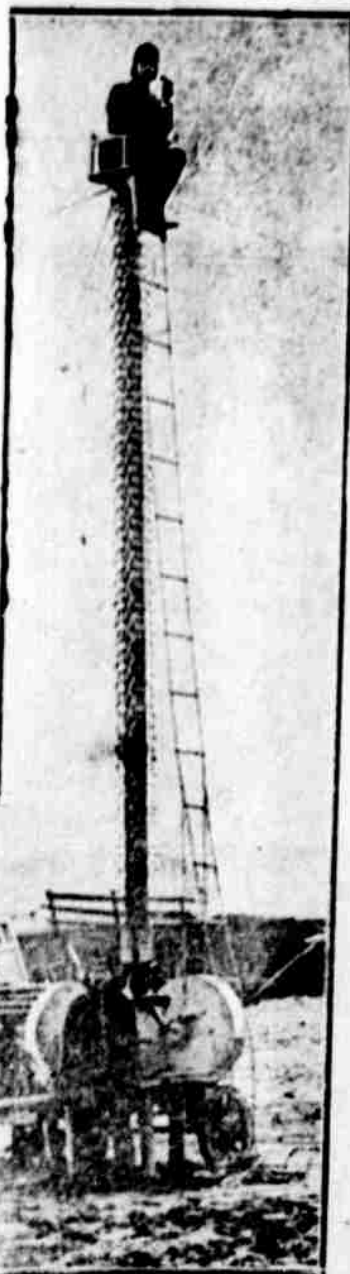
SALEM, Aug. 28.—Whether the federal game law, which provides for an open season for duck hunting in the state from October 1 to January 15 of each year, supersedes the state law on the subject, is a question with which State Game Warden Evans finds himself confronted, and he has signified his intention of requesting an opinion with relation to the matter from the attorney general.

The state law provides that the season shall be open for duck and goose hunting in District No. 1, comprising

the counties of Multnomah, Clatsop, Columbia and Tillamook, from September 15 to December 31, and that it shall be open in District No. 2, comprising the eastern section of the state, from September 15 to February 15 of each year. Should the federal law supersede the state law, it will mean that the season will not open in either district until fifteen days after the date provided for by the state law, and that the season will close in District No. 2 thirty days earlier than is provided for by the state law.

Being a Vegetarian Won't Drop Expenses

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 28.—Turning vegetarian to cut down the high cost of meat would be cutting off the nose to spite the face, because vegetables prices are higher this year than last, according to the latest statistics compiled by the Department of Agriculture from reports from all parts of the United States.

Although the general crop outlook is high above the average, due to the record wheat and corn crops, and while vegetables may be cheaper in some localities, the average vegetable prices through the country have advanced over last year.

The potato crop this year is estimated at 350,000,000 bushels, and while this is slightly in excess of the five year average, it is only 83 per cent perfect, against a ten year condition of 88 per cent.

On July 1 the price of potatoes was 81 cents a bushel, against the five year average of 76 cents. Sweet potato crop conditions are 16 per cent under the ten year average, but the

price on July 1 was slightly less than a year ago.

Tomatoes, cabbage and onions are all below normal, and beans are 1 per cent above the average for ten years. Cabbage is selling at \$2.61 per 100 pounds throughout the country, as against \$2.18 this time last year. While beans are at the same price, onions are selling at \$1.41 a bushel, against 96 cents last year.

Prospects are said to be favorable to some reductions in prices, the department says.

Fruit crops of all kinds have excellent prospects, the apple crop being in particularly good condition. The composition condition of all crops in the United States is 1.4 per cent better than the average ten year average, and 8.7 per cent above last year.

Latest reports to the bureau of statistics show that beef prices have gone up from \$6.02 per 100 pounds last year to \$6.32 this year; hogs have declined from \$7.61 to \$7.43; sheep from \$4.84 to \$4.76, while lamb has advanced from \$6.23 to \$6.47, and veal from \$7.33 to \$7.69.

SPEECHES FILL THE MAILS NOW

UNABLE TO GET HOME AND CAMPAIGN, CONGRESSIONAL MEN ARE USING LONG RANGE AMMUNITION

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 28.—Evidence that members of congress are preparing their campaigns for reelection next fall with a vim is seen at the local postoffice in the greatly increased volume of "franked" mail.

This "franked" matter includes speeches and marked portions of the Congressional Record, together with matter from party headquarters.

Recently, during one half a day there were sent out, by actual count, 219,000 short speeches; 38,000 long speeches and 214 sacks of campaign material.

It has been found necessary to employ additional force of mail distributors and clerks.

If the campaign gets any hotter even more will be needed, according to the postmaster.
