Blackburn hospital. She is improving so rapidly that she was moved to her home early this afternoon.

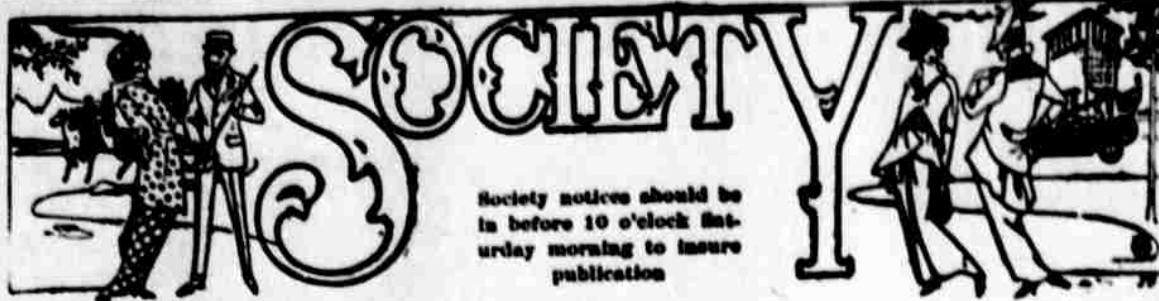
Kuyk Returns.
