REDDING IS IN A SERIOUS FIX

FIRE WHICH DESTROYED THE
SUB-STATION FRIDAY LEAVES
THE TOWN WITHOUT LIGHTS,
WATER, ICE OR NEWSPAPERS

Redding people looked for dire results when the sub-station there burned Friday, but the results to date are much more serious than at first imagined.

In the first place, the city is without lights or power, owing to the fire. This means that in addition to the darkness, the papers are not being

printed—with the European war going good.

Besides this, the reservoir's supply of water was sadly depleted in fighting the fire. The water is pumped there by electricity, so until the damage is repaired, water must be used sparingly, and there is constant danger of more fire breaking out, and no water to fight it.

The thermometer has also gone up there, and Saturday it registered 102. The stopping of the electricity also stopped the ice plant, and to make things more uncomfortable, the smoke from forest fires hang like a pall over the town, smarting the eyes and choking the lungs.

EDMUND TRACEY MAKES LAST TRIP

OLD TIME PROSPECTOR FOUND
DEAD IN BED SUNDAY MORN-
ING—HAS LOCATED MANY
FINE CLAIMS

Edmund James Tracey, an old-time prospector, was found dead in his bed in one of the Molschenbacher tent houses Sunday morning. On the preceding night he had complained of gas distressing him.

Tracey was 62 years of age, and a native of Canada. He has made innumerable trips through the hills of

Oregon, Nevada and British Columbia, and located several good claims, which he sold for substantial sums.

Notice

Your attention is called to the following section of the city ordinance against starting fires in the city:

"Section 22.—It shall be unlawful for any person or corporation, either by him or themselves or his or their agent or employee to cause any fire to be kindled on any asphalt or similar pavement or to heat any roofing or other material on or above such pavement, OR TO BURN IN THE

OPEN ANYWHERE IN THE CITY LIMITS, offal, refuse, garbage or other matter causing noxious odors, or to burn on the unpaved or any street or alley or private property a solid city without first obtaining permission from the chief of police, and under such precaution as he may direct, any paper, straw, vegetable matter, leaves, wood or other substance emitting in combustion sparks, flying ashes or cinders, or dangerous to adjacent property."

The charter provides a penalty for the violation of the ordinance of a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$100 or by imprisonment in the city jail not less than two nor more than fifty days. You are hereby notified to take warning.
