Walter Hagen, New Golf Champion



Walter Hagen, the 22-year-old Rochester professional who won Francis Ouimet's national golf title at Chicago, says his success is due to heeding Harry Vardon's advice to "shoot straight for the flag." Ohio Plans Better Care of Tubercular Patients

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Sept. 3.—Hospitalization of one consumptive prevents the infection of ten other people. Hospital care and treatment provide practically the one chance of recovery for the patient.

These are the facts on which the Ohio Society for the Prevention of Tuberculosis and the division of tuberculosis of the state health board are basing their present campaign to procure adequate hospital facilities for consumptives. It is estimated that there are 35,000 residents of the state now suffering from the "great white plague."

State health officials have outlined twelve tentative hospital districts of from four to six counties each, wherein campaigns will be started for the erection of district tuberculosis hospitals to be maintained jointly by the co-operating counties.

Sixty-five of Ohio's eighty-eight counties have made provision for the hospital care of their tuberculosis victims. It is in these counties that the campaign is to be waged. This movement is possible now for the first time in the history of the state through the enactment of the amended county district tuberculosis hospital law by the last legislature.

SHIPPINGTON, Sept. 3.—Most of the people about Upper Klamath Lake are out pluming most of their time now. Wild plums are plentiful in most places this season.

The road to Shippington is just a streak of dust and a right of way. It only takes a good rain to turn this would-be road into a mortar trough.

The steamer Masama (Captain Taylor) is transporting a lot of lumber from the Utter & Burns mill at Fort Klamath to the Klamath Manufacturing company's plant at Shippington.

Saturday night the steamer Eagle brought down a 100-ton barge load of sand.

The steamer Modoc brought down two big log rafts from Crystal. One was consigned to the Algoma, and the other to the Long Lake plant.

The steamer Annie Laurie is lying at her dock, undergoing some minor

repairs. Captain Guthrie is also doing some painting about the ladies' cabin.

The steamer Klamath is at the Pelican Bay Lumber company's dock, acting as a tender for the company's work.

The steamer Winema went up the lake Tuesday with an assorted cargo. Most of it was bound for Rocky Point.
