## SOME MINOR WAR NEWS FROM EUROPE

LITTLE STORIES FROM THE FRONT THAT ARE COMING IN THROUGH THE CAPITALS OF THE NATIONS NOW FIGHTING EACH OTHER—SOME ARE TRIVIAL, BUT ALL ARE INTERESTING AT THIS TIME.

LONDON, Sept. 14.—The following was sent to the Express by its Berlin correspondent before communication with Berlin was cut off:

BERLIN—Germany, it has often been said, is the land of forbidden things. Everything is "verboten," and many things are "strong verboten" (strictly forbidden). This in time of peace. You may, therefore, well imagine how things are in time of war. A list of things forbidden in Berlin would surely cover several columns of the Express, but it would be tedious. The most characteristic, however, is that it is forbidden not to believe what the Wolff telegraph agency says about German victories. In Germany everybody so far believes implicitly that Wolff cannot err. Should there be anyone courageous enough to doubt, he would be considered a foe and a spy. And then—

Everything foreign has, of course, been eradicated from Berlin for the last week. A shop in the Friedrichstrasse was almost demolished by the crowd because it is called "The Prince of Wales," and advertises in big letters that it sells "Ulster coats." An Indian tea room has thought it necessary to take away the word "Indian" from its sign before the mob does it. The same thing for French signs. The Berlin "Chate Noir" has become the "Schwartz Kater," which means the "black cat," and is perfectly senseless, of course.

A restaurant on the Kurfurstendamm was destroyed a few nights ago because somebody had thought the band played a Russian song; in the same street the restaurant called "Boncourt" changed its name on account of the French sonority of that name, which is really taken from a character in one of Kleist's patriotic plays. Foreign names have not only been wiped off the signs, but even from bills of fare. What Berlin restaurants generally advertised as "creme double" (French cream cheese) is now called "Doppelt-Kahm," which nobody understands. Kumpsteak has been changed into Rumpsteak. In a restaurant where I asked the waiter for some "Worcestershire sauce," I received first a suspicious glance, then was told grimly: "We no longer sell that d— in English sauce!"

PARIS, Sept. 14.—The strictness of the French press censorship can be more forcibly realized when one reads the law passed by parliament governing publishing of news. The law, in part, reads: "Journalists are forbidden to publish information other than that communicated by the government or the military authorities on the following points: Military operations, mobilization, transport of troops, transport of war materials, composition of divisions, etc., strategic plans, lists of wounded, killed and prisoners, fortifications, provisions, movement of the fleet, etc., and in general all information of a military or diplomatic character tending to favor the enemy and damp the spirit of the army and the public."

The law forbids any correspondent to approach nearer than twenty-five miles to the frontier or wherever the battle line may be.

## Rental Agreement for the County Poor Farm

### (Advertisement)

THIS AGREEMENT, made this 17th day of September, A. D. 1914, by and between Klamath County, a body corporate and politic of the State of Oregon, of the first part, and F. C. Markwardt of Klamath County, State of Oregon of the second part.

WITNESSETH That the said party of the first part, in consideration of the covenants and agreements on the part of the party of the second part, hereby leases, demises and lets to the said party of the second part, commencing the first day of October, 1914, the said Klamath County's poor farm ranch, less that part above the ditch, for a period of five years, for the following rental: The said party of the second part to pay Three Hundred and Thirty-Three and 33-100 (\$333.33) Dollars per year for the first three years, and Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars cash per year for the remaining two years, the said party of the first part agreeing that the rental for the first three years may be offset by the party of the second part doing the necessary improvement work within said period, consisting of ditching for drainage, and generally such improvement work as the judgment and experience of the party of the second part indicates as needed; the reasonable value of such improvement is hereby agreed to be the sum of One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars.

The party of the first part agree that the second party shall be allowed to farm according to his best judgment, provided the work is done in a husbandlike manner. The first party further agrees to pay monthly to the party of the second part at the rate of thirty dollars per month for the board, washing, sleeping accommodations, and general care of each and every adult inmate of said poor farm, the said second party agreeing to provide a good and peaceful home and for the general welfare of the inmates. The first party is to give free use of house, furniture, bedding, farm machinery and implements and chattels as per invoice attached. The party of the second part agrees to haul the county poor of said Klamath County, and to care for the same according to the will of the County Court of said Klamath County, the party of the first part agreeing to require such pauper inmates as are physically able to work, to perform work un-

der the direction and for the benefit of the second party, reasonably according to the ability of such inmates, said first party to receive credit therefor at regular wages. Said first party agreeing to pay for all nursing and medical attention, when same is deemed necessary, including medicines and appliances for treatment, the second party agreeing to board nurses at the same price as inmates, and it is agreed that the second party shall be liable only for loss and breakage caused by willful neglect and carelessness, the first party to replace all worn articles and especially worn and useless bedding, where the condition is not owing to neglect of second party, and the first party agrees to pay for all material needed for improvement and repairs, the second party at his cost to supply all wood and light necessary for heating and lighting the building. In case of loss, damage or destruction by fire or the elements or casualty not owing to neglect of second party, the first party is to repair or rebuild, or this lease may be terminated at the option of the second party. The second party agrees to buy of the first party all live stock as follows: to be paid for by said second party one-tenth of purchase price per month: 2 horses, \$400.00; 26 head of hogs, \$255.00; 4 cows, \$240.00; 1 steer, \$45.00; 4 calves, \$60.00; making a total of \$1,000.00 to be paid by the second party. Said ten percent to be deducted each month by said first party from amounts due said second party for care of poor.

It is finally agreed by the parties that in all matters pertaining to irrigation, the first party is to pay all construction charges, and the second party the cost of maintenance.
