

## GERMANS ON OFFENSE NOW

### Retreat Stops; Allies' Losses Heavier

 PARIS, Sept. 15.—The war office at Bordeaux at 3 o'clock telegraphed the following:  
 "Yesterday the German legions began to resist the French advance at the line they have established. This battle front is established on a line through the forests at la Aisle and Craonne and at the center to the north of Hiers and Chalons."  
 This is the first admission the war office has made, since the German retreat of a week ago, that the German army had begun to return to the attack. It is believed that the Kaiser's artillery has reached entrenched positions previously prepared by them.  
 That a big battle is imminent is obvious, now that the retreat has stopped. In addition, another German force is concentrating and preparing for a stand east of Amiens. If they can return before the allies can prevent it they are expected to resume the offensive.  
 According to the latest accounts from the front, the German resistance is becoming more serious. They are bringing the artillery into play, and the losses of the allies are heavier.

## ANKENY CANAL A LIVE ISSUE YET

MATTER IS NOW UP TO SECRETARY LANE—AFTER THIS, IT WILL BE REFERRED TO THE VOTERS FOR THEIR PLEASURE.  
 Though it is not as much before the public eye as in the past, the Ankeny canal abatement project is still far from being a bygone issue. There is every reason to believe that the voters will decide points about it at the next election.  
 Some time ago the city council put up to the reclamation commission the question of the government turning the Ankeny canal control over to the city, the municipality to assume the government's obligation to furnish water to the holders of water rights under the ditch. The commission acted favorably on this, and it is now up to Secretary Lane of the interior department.  
 After Lane's approval is given the matter will be submitted to the voters and if they vote for the city to take control, the government will make the transfer.  
 After that the city will be able to take action to close this disease-breeding waterway.

## WALKS MUST BE PUT IN REPAIR

NOTICES WILL BE SERVED ON PROPERTY OWNERS OF TOWN TO MAKE SIDEWALKS SAFE FOR WINTER.  
 If the serving of orders for repairing, straightening, leveling and otherwise putting in shape of sidewalks is of any avail, the walks throughout the city will be in first class shape this winter, for the city is going to serve these notices.  
 As an incentive to property owners to put these walks in shape it was pointed out at last night's meeting of the council that after the city has served a sidewalk repair notice, the property owner, not the city, is held liable for any damages that might be demanded as a result of injury on that walk.  
 TURKEY SAID TO BE DECIDEDLY NEUTRAL.  
 CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 15.—Reports are current in official circles that Turkey has finally decided to remain neutral, and not support Germany.

## Medill's Check Is Cashed

### Authorities Unable to Ascertain Who Got Money

Who cashed W. J. Medill's check at the Monople store in Bonanza shortly after May 11 is a question the sheriff's office is endeavoring to solve. One thing is certain, and this is that Medill did not cash it.  
 According to Chris Edler, Frank Williams, in jail on charge of killing A. C. McLeod, and suspected of doing away with Medill, worked with Medill on the Edler ranch at Keno Springs. They worked there from May 1 to May 11.  
 On that day Williams was given a check for \$9 and Medill one for \$12. The checks were made out to them by J. Blaisdel, forman for Edler.  
 When Williams returned to Bonanza he presented his check at the Bank of Bonanza, and received cash for it. The same day Medill's check was cashed at the Monople store.  
 On the Medill check endorsement the initials were "A. J." instead of "W. J." A pen fault made the "W" look like an "A" on the front of the check. A comparison of the signature on the check with Medill's signature shows it to be entirely different.  
 Inquiry is being made for Blaisdel, the ranch foreman, by the sheriff's office. It is believed he will be able to tell just when Williams and Medill left Keno Springs, as since that time Medill has never been heard of.  
 Drs. Cathay & Johnson, in the presence of District Attorney Irwin, this morning made an examination of the wounds on William's abdomen and leg, which he says he received before being put in jail, and upon which it is believed, a fight on the grounds of self defense will be based. The doctors did not make any statement regarding their examination.

## Uhlans Cut Up While Entangled in Fence



Belgians shot down Uhlans, the crack German cavalry, by the score when they made their sorties over the country by entangling them in barbed wire fences through which their horses sometimes found it impossible to pass. This illustration shows a company of them tied up while Belgian soldiers from a distance are shooting them down. These Uhlans have over spread Belgium and part of France during the war. It was their business to cut telegraph and telephone wires ahead of the main army and spread terror among the peasants. They invariably tried to make a show of force to prove their numbers were much greater than they really were.

## DISCONTENT IN GERMANY REPORT

GOVERNMENT IS CHARGED WITH WITHHOLDING THE TRUE EXTENT OF THE LOSSES FROM PEOPLE AT HOME.

## BELGIANS MIX WITH GERMANS

WITH KING DIRECTING SWIFT ATTACK, BELGIANS FROM ANTWERP GET NEAR BRUSSELS. SAY KAISER SEEKS PEACE.

 ANTWERP, Sept. 15.—The Belgians have returned to the first line of Antwerp's fortifications after four days of harrying two German corps, a heavy unit of German marines and 10,000 reserve sailors. This fight by the Belgians was an effort to prevent these reinforcements from reaching von Kluk's weakened flank before Paris.  
 Although outnumbered two to one, the Belgians fought desperately. King Albert personally directed the operations, and so swift were the Belgian moves that they were almost in Brussels before the Germans, reinforced, took the offensive, and the Belgians retired.

 PARIS, Sept. 15.—It is declared here that General von der Holz, the German military governor of Belgium, visited Antwerp recently under safe conduct, and made overtures for the ending of the war as it effects Germany and Belgium, in return for certain concessions.  
 It is said that in view of the "all for one, one for all" agreement of the allies, Belgium refused to consider this proposal.

## CZAR ANGRY AT WILHELM

### Wants To March Into Berlin Victor

 PETROGRAD, Sept. 15.—It is understood today that Russia's proposed invasion of Austria has been abandoned. It has been decided to hold the entire first and second lines of troops for the capture of Berlin.  
 Court officials say that Czar Nicholas now thoroughly hates Kaiser Wilhelm. He is determined to personally enter Berlin at the head of his Muscovites.  
 The feeling is growing here that Austria will yield. Already the Austrian losses are over 250,000.  
 The war office says the Russians are attacking the Austrians because they are reinforcements being sent to Renshanp in East Prussia. It is understood that operations are designed principally to prevent their joining the body.

 VIENNA, (via Rome), Sept. 15.—The authorities are engaged in suppressing rioting, street parades, etc., by the unemployed. The government plans food depots.  
 Trainloads of improperly cared for wounded are arriving. Many of the army surgeons at the front are inexperienced, so civilian doctors are helping.

## VON KLUK CAPTURED DISCREDITED TODAY

 LONDON, Sept. 15.—A Central News dispatch says that 14,000 German troops, including General von Kluk, have been surrounded and captured at Dieppe. This is discredited at army headquarters.  
 The officers say the French would have confirmed this if it was true. The report that the French have retaken Maubege with a big capture is also discredited.

## Spends Night in Open

### His Launch Disabled, Bishop, Children Marooned

Marooned at Squaw Point on the Upper Lake by a broken timer in his motor boat, B. St. Geo. Bishop and small children, Barbara and Leonard, spent last night in an open boat, and remained there until late this morning, when they were picked up by the mail boat Spray. They reached home this afternoon, where Mrs. Bishop, with misgivings, awaited their coming since yesterday afternoon.  
 After attending to business interests in Klamath Falls, Bishop left yesterday afternoon in his launch for "The Cedars," his pretty homestead above Rocky Point. When between Buck Island and the Pelican Bay cut, his timer became faulty, and he was towed back to Buena Vista by John Linneman, and his timer was repaired.  
 Bishop's departure after this was about 4 o'clock, and until he was heard of himself and children was a cause of as much concern to his many friends in Klamath Falls as to the little wife and mother, who spent a sleepless night on the homestead.  
 As soon as it became known that Bishop's boat had not put in, searching parties scattered in all directions. J. J. Parker took charge of the work for the local Elk, and after he was telephoned regarding the matter, S. O. Johnson sent several launches out from Harriman Lodge. The Eagle Ridge boats were all out early, and Ray Telford went to Algoma in an auto to go out from there in the Algoma boat.  
 Wickstroms, Linnemans and other people along the Shippington water front also took up the quest. The Elks were just starting for the landing to embark when the message came that Bishop was safe.  
 "I was right close to shore when the timer went bad," phoned Bishop to the Herald this afternoon, "and so I paddled the boat in and prepared to spend the night there. There were a couple of comforters, and the kiddies, far from being exhausted or cold, looked upon the affair as a huge outing."  
 "Squaw's Point is so isolated that it was impossible to reach a telephone to tell my wife that we were not in any danger, so I had to wait for the mail boat. Since we got some coffee in us we are as good as new, and while we heartily appreciate the fraternal spirit displayed by the Elks and our other friends, we feel sorry that circumstances prevented us from allaying any fears felt by anybody."
