When put to a vote Hamilton and Matthews voted "aye" and Owens and Lockwood in the negative. Mayor Nicholas settled the tie by casting his ballot with Matthews.

INSURANCE MEN IN CONVENTION

NORTH CAROLINA CITY IS HOST TO DELEGATES FROM ALL PARTS OF THE COUNTRY—GOVERNOR IS SPEAKER.

C., Sept. 15.—Governor Locke Craig of North Carolina today delivered the principal address of welcome at the opening of the national convention of insurance commissioners here. Mayor James E. Rankin and James H. Southgate of Durham, also spoke briefly, welcoming the delegates to Asheville. The principal feature of the day's session was the address of James R. Young, insurance commissioner of North Carolina and president of the association. He responded to the welcoming address.

External Storm Sewer. The city council Monday night authorized the extension of the storm sewer system on Third street from Jefferson, the original terminal, to Main street. This is to be a ten-inch main, capable of carrying off all the rain and snow water without damage to any property.

Willamette-Pacific trains will be operating to Mapleton by October 1. First installment of \$10,000 for the McKenzie Pass road has reached Eugene, and \$70,000 will be spent in all.

How Germany Feeds Her Immense Army

NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—Among the unnamed heroes in the European war whose marvelous deeds receive little or no attention are the men who take care of the hungry soldiers and the horses during and after battle. In an up-to-date army these men form a little army by themselves, and from the very commencement of war a great strain falls upon their shoulders. The responsibilities of the department for food supply are simply stupendous, and to fulfill successfully its task the provision department must be equipped and organized to perfection. The feeding of a modern army is a problem of the utmost significance, as upon the efficiency of regular and quick supply of nourishing food depends its success to a very large extent. A German army of 1,000,000 men consumes daily not less than 500 tons of food, while the feeding of horses requires daily quantities of over twice that weight. The German military supply department is divided into two divisions, the first of which is responsible for the quick and timely distribution of food, forage and extra clothing, while the second division is called the medical department, and attends to medical supplies only. The main difficulties which confront the food supply department in war are the obstacles which may block the way of the supply columns. Aside from bad roads, wagons will break down, horses will be lost, and if these things are avoided the roads will be blocked by ambulances, marching troops, etc.

Also, as soon as the army begins to operate out of its own territory, there are the possibilities of the destruction of food magazines and the owners of obtainable food will often hide or destroy available victuals rather than let the enemy have them. The war equipment of each German soldier includes the so-called "iron ration," consisting of the arbutus, preserved meat and vegetables, biscuits, coffee and salt sufficient to furnish satisfactory meals for three days. A very simple but exceptionally part of these rations is the arbutus, or pea bologna, which is made of mashed peas, to which minced bacon, salt and spices are added, and which, through extraction of the moisture, is preserved in containers of parchment about ten inches long and two inches wide. The simple addition of hot water to this preparation creates a wholesome, nourishing and decidedly tasty meal. In case of dire necessity the preparation can also be used cold. Each army corps, 40,000 men, is accompanied by twelve or thirteen supply columns, or one wagon to about 500 men, carrying a full ration for two days for each man. The organization provides for food magazines on a large scale, which sends to the different army corps at regular intervals supply columns with rations per man for four days, and which is supplemented in proportion. Thus we see that the German soldier in the field is practically continuously in reach of provisions for nine full days, and the possibility of starving soldiers, provided sufficient time is found for meals, is very remote.

ADDITION TO THE BAKERY BURNS

FIRE DEPARTMENT CALLED OUT AT AN EARLY MORNING HOUR BY BLAZE SUPPOSED TO HAVE STARTED FROM FURNACE

Fire, believed to have started from the furnace spread in the wooden addition to the new Normal bakery on Pine street, near Tenth, and at 3 o'clock this morning a fire alarm was sent in.

The flames were checked before the addition was destroyed, but there will be considerable work required to put it in tenable shape again. The main portion of the bakery, containing the machinery, etc., is in the brick structure, so was not in any way injured.

Forty-Five Killed in the "Frisco" Wreck

United Press Service ST. LOUIS, Sept. 15.—At least forty-five people were killed near Lebanon this morning when the "Frisco" passenger, leaving here last night, was derailed there. The wreck was done, making communication difficult.

At noon twenty-six bodies had been recovered from the wreck. The others have been taken out since that time. The identification of the victims is proceeding slowly. This is extremely hard, as most of the bodies were clad in sleeping garments.

Earl Kitchener the English Minister



This is the latest photograph of Earl Kitchener, the new war minister of England, whose success in landing Russian troops on French soil is considered one of the brilliant strokes of the war. While it is not definitely known how many Russians have reached France, some estimates have gone as high as 250,000. The sudden movement of the right flank of the German armies before Paris in their turn to the south has been explained in some quarters by their knowledge that a large Russian and English force had landed and was about to march on their rear. The Russian troops were taken all the way from Archangel in transports to Scotland and then hurried on through England by train.
