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## GERMAN FORCE REFORMING TO MAKE ATTACK

BORDEAUX, Sept. 16.—War Minister Millerand announced at cabinet meeting today that the situation is satisfactory to the allies. He says the Germans have stopped their precipitate flight, but are retiring slowly, and that they are repulsed wherever they attempt to resume the offensive.

BERLIN, (via The Hague), Sept. 16.—The war office announces that the Germans have checked the allies offensive everywhere in France. The general staff reports show that the new plans are working nicely.

LONDON, Sept. 16.—War office advices indicate the Germans have succeeded in reforming, and are preparing for a new offensive movement. It is believed the real contest will be between the French central force commanded by Joffre, and the combined armies of the German crown prince and the Duke of Wurttemberg.

PARIS, Sept. 16.—There are indications that the Germans are reforming. They are strongly entrenched in the low hills north of Aisne. Bridges have been destroyed by the Germans as they crossed, and as the rains have swollen the rivers they cannot be forded. The war office telegraphs the following regarding the battle which has been progressing since Monday on the northern and eastern fronts: "The rear guard of the German army is reinforcing, and it has been making a defensive fight since Monday. The situation is excellent, despite this."

## New Co. Agriculturist Is Now in Klamath

WASHINGTON COUNTY MAN WILL CARRY ON THE WORK SO WELL STARTED BY McCALL—DEPARTURE OF McCALL IS DEEPLY REGRETTED BY HIS MANY FRIENDS THROUGHOUT THIS COUNTY.

To accept the position of county agriculturist, H. Roland Glassey arrived Tuesday night from Forest Grove. He is being acquainted with local conditions by Max A. McCall, who resigns the position to accept the vice directorship of the dry land demonstration department at the Washington State College.

Glassey, like McCall, is a graduate of the Oregon Agricultural College. He is familiar with the character of farming carried on here, as he last year conducted the department of agriculture at the Enterprise high school with wonderful results, and put in several months as deputy agriculturist of Union county, where dry and irrigated farming methods are used. He comes to Klamath county highly recommended by the officials of the Agricultural College.

McCall leaves in the morning to assume his new duties. It was his intention to remain a few days longer, but he has received several urgent telegrams.

In his two years of residence here McCall has won a host of friends, who, while they rejoice at his promo-

tion, greatly regret losing such an enterprising, clean-cut young man from the community. After coming here in 1912, he established the agricultural department of the high school, and taught it with gratifying results, until he resigned this spring to take up the duties of agriculturist. In addition to his instructions in agriculture, McCall also took charge of the athletic activities of the high school for the faculty, and under his tutelage, football, basketball and other sports, became developed to such an extent that the Klamath county high school teams are factors to be reckoned with in the settling of the Southern Oregon championships.

As county agriculturist he has been equally successful. Though in the office only a short time, he attained results, as many farmers will attest.

## 60,000 Germans Now in Belgium

## U. S. TROOPS TO LEAVE MEXICO

UNDERSTOOD THAT PRESIDENT WILL PRESS CLAIMS OF AMERICANS FOR DAMAGES FROM DEPREDAATIONS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 16.—An order was issued today for the withdrawal of the American forces from Vera Cruz.

Administration officials think that President Wilson will not ask the Mexican government for an indemnity to cover the expenses of the American operations at Vera Cruz and Tampico. It is understood that he intends to press the claims of Americans for damages, amounting to millions, for depredations of the warring Mexicans.

## RUSSIANS CLAIM VICTORY; AUSTRIA SAYS "NOT TRUE"

DANKI'S COMMAND CAUSE OF THE CONTENTION

Latest Petrograd Dispatches Also State That a Large Number of Germans Have Been Taken Prisoners in the Fighting in Galicia—Believed Czech German Artillery Unit Is One of the Captured Bodies.

PETROGRAD, Sept. 16.—It is stated today that General Danki's force of Austrians have been cut off from the Austrian center, and that they were unable to reach Przemysl, which the Russians now invest.

Danki was trapped in the bogs wherein he had hoped to entice the Russians.

It is announced that 5,000 Germans are included in the military prisoners taken in Galicia. Thirty-six cannon, bearing the kaiser's crest were captured.

VIENNA, (via Rome), Sept. 16.—The war office today denies that Danki has surrendered. Dispatches say that the Russians had almost surrounded his command, but that his cavalry cut the way out for the force, and joined the main force.

The war office admits the Austrian losses were heavy, but say the Russians have not invested Przemysl.

## Liege Quitted, Says Late Wire

BERLIN, (via Rome), Sept. 16.—An official statement is issued that the Germans have abandoned Liege.

No reason for this is known, and there is no confirmation from other sources. It has been reported that German communications have been threatened, but London and Paris reports have not intimated operations in Belgium except those of the Belgians.

Possibly the troops have been sent to aid the Germans in France.
