

SOME MINOR WAR NEWS FROM EUROPE

LITTLE STORIES FROM THE FRONT THAT ARE COMING IN THROUGH THE CAPTAINS OF THE NATIONS NOW FIGHTING EACH OTHER—SOME ARE TRIVIAL, BUT ALL ARE INTERESTING AT THIS TIME.

United Press Service LONDON, Oct. 9.—That the stage still plays an important part in sustaining public spirit and forwarding movements for the aid of the Red Cross, has been fully demonstrated here by Sir Herbert Tree's revival of "Drake."

From the first performance, the patriotic scenes portrayed in this drama have aroused the audiences to tremendous outbursts of patriotic enthusiasm. Every night the vast audiences gather in His Majesty's theater and wildly cheer the stirring scenes. The effect of these demonstrations is being witnessed by heavy increases in the donations to relief funds and by many recruits from among the young men theatre-goers.

United Press Service LONDON, Oct. 9.—Great Britain has declared war on Germany's trade and detailed plans are already under way to replace all articles bearing the familiar "Made in Germany" trademark with goods made by English manufacturers. All foreign consuls and representatives have been instructed to supply full details and samples of imports and exports of Germany.

Governors of the various British dominions have been supplied with samples of articles that can be manufactured in their territories and factories are being ordered into commission for the supply of this trade.

United Press Service TOKYO, Oct. 9.—Since the beginning of the war between Germany and Japan, there has been what appears to be a systematic effort to create ill-feeling between Japan and the United States. This has been manifested in many ways, but particularly through the publication of reports of demands which the United States would make of Japan, and of American sympathy for Germany.

A report that the United States had sold several warships to Germany was given wide publication, and for a few days created violent anti-American sentiment. It is generally believed that Russia is fostering this attitude in an attempt to weaken Japan.

United Press Service Havre, France, Oct. 9.—The individual bravery of the British army engineers is being lauded here by prisoners and wounded coming from the front. An instance of the courage of these bridge builders is shown in the account of how an engineer sergeant gave his life to save from annihilation a small body of English engineers who were protecting a bridge. The odds were against them, and the Germans were on the point of crossing the bridge, when the sergeant darted out under the German fire, set a quantity of high explosive under the first span and destroyed it. Forced to use a short fuse, he had no time to escape and was blown to pieces.

United Press Service TOKYO, Oct. 9.—For the past two weeks a large part of the Japanese officialdom has been busy announcing to the spirits of the many imperial ancestors the declaration of war on Germany. The most important of these ceremonies was held at the imperial sanctuary in the palace at Tokyo, conducted by the emperor himself. Special messengers were dispatched to the grand shrines and the tombs of Emperors Jimmu and Meiji. The Japanese firmly believe that these ceremonies make them invincible in war, owing to the aid given them by their ancestors. Most Japanese books dealing with the Russo-Japanese war give the imperial ancestors credit for Japan's victory in that conflict.

KLAMATH TRIALS ON AT MEDFORD

BESIDES THE BEALL CASE, JUST ENDED, THE FEDERAL COURT THERE WILL TRY OUT BROWN MURDER CASE

Klamath Indians are much in evidence at Medford, as the cases which are usually taken up in Portland before the federal district court are being tried at Medford before Federal Judge Wolverton.

Besides the Link River Beall case, disposed of last night, a second Klamath reservation homicide is to be tried. This is the trial of Jim George, who is charged with the murder of Peter Brown, following a drinking bout at a dance at Plate camp.

Brown and George left together, and later Brown's body, with bullets in the back, was found.

There have been about 100 Indians subpoenaed for these and other cases. As a result, the bootlegger has become active in Medford, and the Medford police Wednesday evening arrested a man who admitted the sale of intoxicants to the red men.

Cook county has 18,761 acres of open land, 5,000 acres less than three years ago.

Marshfield has voted \$10,000 bonds for a gymnasium building.

The Pacific Power and Light company has been granted a franchise to furnish power and light to the city of Warrenton.

The Hotel Simpson, the new \$75,000 hotel for North Bend, is expected to be finished and ready to open by July 1, 1915.
