### Early Xmas Shopping as an Aid to Business

CHICAGO, Oct. 12.—A "Do your Christmas shopping early" campaign movement with a double purpose was launched here today by the Consumers' League of Illinois.

that we are trying to get everybody to do their Christmas buying early, to prevent many working girls from being discharged," said Miss Elsa Wertheim, secretary of the league.

"If we can get people all over the country to do their Christmas shopping now, or at least to get started, present trade conditions will be stimulated, and there will be a steady flow of business until the first of the year, when business conditions should return to normal.

"This may save thousands of employees, particularly girls in the department stores, from being discharged. Of course it will also prevent over-working them later in the holiday season, when the aching and frazzled nerves of the shop girl makes Christmas anything but a time of gladness and good will."

Plans of the campaign include visits to heads of department stores for their co-operation, placing the question before women's clubs, and the position of placards advertising the movement.

Steps were taken by Postmaster General Burleson to arrange for the transaction of money order business between the United States and those countries of South and Central America with which the United States does not have conventions for that purpose now.

Americans whose automobiles were commandeered, ordered or requisitioned in Europe at the outbreak of the war have been advised by the state department that they should file claims with the belligerent governments. ### DOAK RANCH IS A BUSY PLACE

WORK ON THE LEVEES TO BE STARTED SOON—THE CANAL IS FULL OF LOGS FOR SAWMILLS AROUND THE LAKE

Work of throwing up sectional levees in the work of reclaiming 1,000 acres of marsh land at the Doak ranch on Upper Klamath Lake, will be started in a few days, according to Superintendent James Douglas. These levees are to enable the easier handling of the situation in case of overflow.

The Doak canal, one of the main features of the reclamation scheme, is filled with logs. In it are 1,500,000 feet of timber, for the Pelican Bay Lumber company.

Besides these logs, Blair and other homestead owners are using a part of the canal and a part of Doak's lake front for the assembling of logs for the Algoma Lumber company and other plants.

### THOMAS WOOD IS DEAD AT SALEM

MAN COMMITTED TO ASYLUM LAST WEEK DIES THERE—MRS. WOOD LEFT THIS MORNING TO GET REMAINS

After being in the state insane asylum for less than a week, Thomas Wood, the Sand Hollow farmer who was committed last week, is dead. He died Monday.

Mrs. Wood left this morning for Salem, and will return with the remains of her husband. Before he left here Mr. Woods was in an extremely delicate state of health, and it was the opinion of officials that he would be benefited by the medical attention at the asylum.

### DAMAGE SUIT IS FILED VS. DOAK

LOSS OF FINGER BY YOUTH RESULTS IN DEMAND FOR \$5,385 FOR EXPENSES, LOSS OF WORK AND DAMAGES

Alleging that D. P. Doak failed to supply a proper building in which to house the engine, and that he was also negligent in safeguarding it, and in instructing his employee in its operation, R. H. Martin, through Mrs. R. H. Martin, his guardian, today commenced a damage suit against the owner of Upper Lake ranch land, F. H. Mills is attorney for the plaintiff.

LINCOLN, Neb., Oct. 13.—Mrs. William Jennings Bryan, as well as her husband, is in favor of woman suffrage, and she has issued a denial of the report that she was opposed to the votes-for-women cause. After Secretary of State Bryan's declaration in favor of the equal suffrage movement, Mrs. Bryan made the following statement, a copy of which she sent to the Nebraska Equal Suffrage Association:

"I am not an anti-suffragist, and have never attended any anti-suffrage meetings. I have been a firm believer in suffrage without sex qualifications

for twenty-five years, and I earnestly wish success to the equal suffrage campaign in Nebraska this fall. Our eldest daughter has been an interested voter in Colorado; our youngest, a member of the Equal Suffrage League of the Nebraska State University.
