U. S. Supreme Court Is in Session Today

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 19.—Meeting today for the first time since the summer recess for the purpose of handing down decisions, the Supreme Court of the United States has a dock- et of already argued cases of great importance. None of the cases equals in interest several of those handed down last season. But there are a number of knotty problems in the settlement of which there is the most intense interest in a number of localities.

One of these is the Maryland "Grandfather" case. This law would not prevent negroes from voting for federal officers, but in state and municipal elections provides that, among other things, a man can vote if his ancestors voted prior to January 1, 1868, or before negroes were enfranchised. This law was applied in Annapolis, capital of Maryland, and four negroes have appealed the case up to the supreme court. It is one of the most peculiar "Grandfather" clauses ever brought up to the supreme court, in that it does not bar negroes, even in its practical working out, from voting for president and congressmen.

Another race question decision which will be handed down in the near future, probably, will be that on the Oklahoma "Jim Crow" law, providing that common carriers must

provide separate compartments for white and black passengers.

A case in which men connected with big business are vitally interested is the case of George G. Henry vs. U. S. Marshal Henkel of New York. On this decision hangs the power of a congressional committee to force an unwilling witness to testify before it. Henry was a partner in the firm of William Salomon & Co., Wall street brokers. He refused to testify before the famous Pujo "money trust" investigation committee.

To Develop Kaolin

Dr. Brower and others whose names he is not yet at liberty to divulge, are at work on a scheme whereby the deposits of kaolin which decorate the bluffs at certain points in the Dead Indian country, are expected to be converted into the body material of a most excellent quality of fireproof and waterproof paint. It is the assertion of the doctor's associates and his own opinion that the kaolin mixed with other ingredients will form a coating for buildings that cannot be beaten by anything now on the market—Ashland Tidings.

Mr. Swander took for his text at the Christian church Sunday morning, Gal. 6:17: "For I bear branded on my body the marks of Jesus." He added these marks upon Paul's body as scars which he had received through persecutions and which were evidences of his loyalty to Christ. "Every Christian," he declared, "must bear in his life evidences of his Christian character and these become marks of Jesus."

The changed life is a mark of Jesus. The Scriptures demand the changed life; one's individual conscience demands it; and the world demands it. Every questionable act of conduct may be settled by it. Before becoming a Christian the Bible calls one "the old man"; after becoming a Christian, "the new man." Set down all the characteristics of the "old man" you can think of, then set down all the characteristics of the "new man" you can think of. In which list does the dance, cards, whiskey, tobacco look the most at home? The spiritual life is a mark of Jesus. The characteristics of the spiritual life are (1) prayer, (2) divine worship? The church of God is

the divine feeding ground, and one will starve unless he goes there. Habitual non-attendance upon church service will never be taken as a credential of Christian character. (3) Loyalty under adverse circumstances. It is easy to be faithful when everything goes well, but difficult when not. (4) Financial support. These are marks of Jesus because they are characteristics of spiritual life.

"The supreme mark of Jesus is one's passion for souls. It cannot be feigned, and one cannot manifest it unless it is genuine. One's concern for lost souls is his best evidence that he belongs to Christ."
